A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CHARLOTTE CALLING FOR A JOINT PUBLIC HEARING TO BE HELD BY THE COUNCIL AND THE CHARLOTTE-MECKLENBURG HISTORIC PROPERTIES COMMISSION ON THE QUESTION OF DESIGNATING THE PROPERTY KNOWN AS THE WILLIAM HENRY BELK HOUSE" AT 200 HAWTHORNE LANE, CHARLOTTE, NORTH CAROLINA (THE EXTERIOR OF THE HOUSE, THE INTERIOR OF THE HOUSE, AND THE ACTUAL GROUND UPON WHICH THE HOUSE SITS) AS HISTORIC PROPERTY.



A RESOLUTION ENDORSING CHARLOTTE-MECKLENBURG'S CURRENT OCCUPANCY TAX

WHEREAS, the City of Charlotte and the local travel industry officials have worked cooperatively in the past in securing a local occupancy tax, and

WHEREAS, the local occupancy tax has generated sufficient revenue to spark new interest and enthusiasm in convention and visitors industry in Charlotte; and

WHEREAS, the formula previously used for distributing the occupancy tax funds to the Convention and Visitors Bureau and the City of Charlotte has worked well and is anticipated to generate even more revenue in the future; and

WHEREAS, the North Carolina Legislature is considering a state-wide local occupancy bill which will allow other cities to impose room taxes which will generate local revenue.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Charlotte endorses the current format for distributing the local occupancy tax funds within the City of Charlotte and Mecklenburg County, and that we would encourage other cities across the state to designate a portion of any local occupancy tax to their respective travel industry representative for use in promoting additional travel and tourism within our state.
