
How would you describe your role at CATS and how it supports our CATS workforce, riders, or community?

I love the people I work with! We have such a great group where everyone works together, and someone is always willing to help. I've built some lasting relationships here over the years that I treasure.




My mother instilled that work ethic in us and taught us to be kind and to follow through with what you say you are going to do. She is my hero!

From a project manager to a stay-at-home mom, women invest in their communities daily, and I think it's important that we recognize their innovation, creativity and impact on our society.


Why is Women's History Month significant to you?


Why is Women's History Month significant to you?
