2. Strategic Transportation Investments Project Rankings

- The Strategic Transportation Investments (STI) legislation was signed into law in June 2013, and fundamentally changed the formula by which transportation projects are funded in North Carolina.
 - It combined several funding sources, and required that all capital expenditures, regardless of mode, be funded from the Highway Trust Fund.
- Further, the STI requires that all modes compete for the same funds. The law defines three categories of projects: statewide, regional impacts, and division needs.
- The Charlotte Regional Transportation Planning Organization (CRTPO) is in the process of implementing its methodology to apply local points to projects analyzed by the North Carolina Department of Transportation.
- Louis Mitchell, Engineer, with the North Carolina Department of Transportation will provide an update on the STI process and the project rankings that were recently released.

3. Charlotte Transit Center - Transfer of Ownership

Synopsis

- The Charlotte Transit Center (CTC) has been operating as a 501(c) 3, non-profit corporation known as the Charlotte Transit Center, Inc. since construction in 1994.
- The corporate structure was a result of the desire by NationsBank (now Bank of America) and the City to partner on design, construction, and operation of the CTC.
- The Corporation's Board of Directors now consists of two representatives from the Bank and two representatives from the Charlotte Area Transit System (CATS).
- As allowed in the corporate bylaws, the Bank now desires to resign from the Corporation as management of a transportation facility is not part of the Bank's core business. The CTC can be operated by the City without the need for a corporate management structure. The Corporation can be dissolved and all existing tenant leases, vendor contracts, agreements, and accounts, including the property itself, can be transferred or assigned to the City by the start of Fiscal Year 2015.
- The transfer should not impact day-to-day transit services, transit riders, or CTC tenants.

Future Action

Staff is requesting the City Council consider approval of the action as part of the business item, on page 22 of tonight's Council Business Agenda.

4. Briefing on the Fall Cankerworm Issue in Charlotte

Synopsis

- Staff will brief the City Council on the fall cankerworm infestation in Charlotte.
 - The cankerworm is a native insect of eastern North America.
 - The populations have been substantially high for 20 years requiring the City to conduct a tree banding program and three aerial sprays in order to protect Charlotte's tree canopy.
 - Nationally known entomologists cannot fully explain why Charlotte's cankerworm population has been persistently high.
 - The current high cankerworm population areas are in south, west, and northeast Charlotte.

- Chapter 3, "Animals" in Part II of the Code of Ordinances regulates animals.
- The Animal Care and Control Division of the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Department have an Animal Control Foster Care Program to provide a nurturing environment for dogs and cats before they are adopted. Examples are puppies and kittens that need to mature, dogs and cats that need rehabilitation, socialization, and training.
- The Zoning Ordinance includes a definition for "commercial kennel" in Section 2.201. There are no definitions in the Zoning Ordinance regarding animal rescue groups, fosterers, and no references to the Animal Care and Control Division.
- To complement the Police Department's fostering program, the Planning Department has prepared a text amendment (#2014-71) to modify the definition of "commercial kennel" to exclude an animal care and control fosterer, an animal rescue group, and an animal rescue group fosterer.
- Definitions for these terms are included in the text amendment. Staff will provide a brief overview of the proposed text amendment.
- Text amendment #2014-71 is scheduled for a public hearing on July 21, 2014.

11. Rezoning Petition 2014-013

Action: Render a decision on proposed rezoning 2014-013 by Hawthorn Retirement, LLC

- From R-3 (single family residential),
- To INST (CD) (institution, conditional)

Staff Resource(s): Tammie Keplinger, Planning

Explanation

- The public hearing on this rezoning petition was held on March 17, 2014.
- The property is approximately 10.01 acres located on the east side of Providence Road between Lakeside Drive and Kuykendall Road (Council District 7).
- The petition proposes to allow the development of a three-story, 134-suite, dependent living facility with a total square footage of approximately 120,000 square feet.
- The petitioner added a note to the site plan after the Zoning Committee vote. On May 19, 2014, the City Council found the change, as follows, was not significant and voted not to refer the petition back to the Zoning Committee for review:
 - All existing trees on Providence Road and Kuykendall Road corridors that are not located within proposed site improvements shall be preserved.
- The decision on this sufficiently protested petition was deferred to June 9, as requested by the petitioner, on May 19, 2014, since not all the City Council members were present at the meeting.
- The Zoning Committee found this petition to be inconsistent with the South
 District Plan but to be reasonable and in the public interest, based on information
 from the staff analysis and the public hearing by a 6-1 vote.
- The staff analysis states that senior living facilities are an institutional use designed to fit into a residential setting, and are considered to be compatible with single-family residential neighborhoods. This type of use has a low impact with respect to noise and traffic due to the nature of the residents. The concentrated building footprint of the proposed development allows for perimeter landscaping, buffers, and a large undisturbed tree save area. The site's location on Providence Road, a major thoroughfare, and Kuykendall Road, a minor thoroughfare, is appropriate for an institutional use such as the proposed facility.
- The Zoning Committee voted 6-1 to recommend APPROVAL of this petition with the following modifications:
 - 1. Amended note 2a to refer to Section 9.503 and specify the type of "Home for the Aged" units as dependent units. The petitioner added the following language for clarity, "except for the two independent units, for management staff only, not for rental purposes."
 - 2. Amended note 4a to specify a maximum proposed building height of 44 feet, which is more restrictive than the 45 feet requested by staff.
 - 3. Removed note 5c from the site plan.
 - 4. Amended note 6a to reflect the amount of tree save provided as specified in the Development Data on sheet 2/3.
 - 5. Provided additional building articulation and step-downs along the southeastern and northern building facades.
 - 6. Revised the Site Section A-A to reflect the current site design.

- 7. Deleted references to Lots A and B in the data table and amended site acreage under the data table to show the proposed acres to remain R-3 and proposed acres to be rezoned.
- 8. Amended the Providence/Kuykendall perspective drawing and explained it is for representational purposes and to refer to the preliminary landscape plan for exact trees and plantings.
- 9. Clarified the use of vinyl by stating the prohibition will not include soffits and windows.
- 10. Added a note to each sign location on the landscape plan stating that they will be subject to a separate permit.
- 11. Added the required eight-foot planting strip along Providence Road to the Preliminary Landscape Plan.
- 12. Amended note 8a to limit the height of freestanding lights to 16 feet, which is more restrictive than the 20 feet requested by staff.
- 13. Clarified "non-peak hours" by specifying the hours of 7am-9am and 4pm-6pm.
- 14. Added the proposed CATS waiting pad to the Preliminary Landscape Plan.
- 15. Removed the "Undisturbed Natural Area" label located on the lower edge of the Preliminary Landscape Plan at the Kuykendall driveway.
- 16. Clarified the conflict between the "Undisturbed Natural Area" labels and the 46-foot Class C buffer that is being planted along the northern property line in common with the abutting property. This was achieved by removing the "Undisturbed Natural Area" labels and adding a note stating "Work within the buffer area limited to planting additional trees and shrubs for benefit of neighboring property owners."
- 17. Labeled the sidewalk around and extending from the covered well to the sidewalk along Kuykendall Road shown on the lower right hand corner of the Preliminary Landscape Plan.
- 18. Amended site plan to reflect a required 50-foot Class C buffer instead of the 46-foot Class C buffer.
- 19. Removed unneeded sheets in the site plan packet.
- 20. Added note 8b for garage lighting.
- 21. Added overhang foliage to the retaining wall on the landscape plan and site sections.
- The minority of the Zoning Committee felt the proposed building was out of scale and context for the area and expressed concerned about the impact the grading would have on the existing trees. Newly planted trees would take years to grow and, due to the elevation difference, would leave the proposed building exposed to the neighborhood to the rear.
- Staff agrees with the recommendation of the majority of the Zoning Committee.

 - Frank Vance Road: a petition from the owners of this 19.34-acre property located in the 6900 block, and on the west side of Beatties Ford Road.
- These areas are vacant land.

History

On May 12, 2014, the City Council approved the Governance & Accountability Committee (Committee) recommendation of the performance review process for the City Manager and the City Attorney, and the subsequent City Council Meeting calendar schedule to accommodate the performance reviews as follows:

- City Manager: Monday July 28, 2014, at 12:00 p.m., CH-14, Charlotte-Mecklenburg Government Center; and
- City Attorney: Monday August 25, 2014, at 12:00 p.m., CH-14, Charlotte-Mecklenburg Government Center.

Explanation

- On May 12, 2014, the City Council approved Phase One of the recommendation, which directs the City Manager and the City Attorney to provide the Committee with recommendations on the performance criteria on which each are evaluated.
- On May 28, 2014, the Committee reviewed the recommended criteria provided by the City Manager and the City Attorney and recommended minor content revisions.
- The Committee recommends the following criteria be used for the performance review of the City Manager:
 - Builds Community,
 - Provides Operational Leadership,
 - Promotes Effective Relationships with the Mayor and the City Council,
 - Develops the City Workforce,
 - Engages in Professional Development, and
 - Manages Special Projects/High-Priority Issues.
- The Committee recommends the following criteria be used for the performance review of the City Attorney:
 - Advises the Mayor and the City Council,
 - Represents the City's Interests,
 - Assists the City Manager and Staff,
 - Manages the City Attorney's Office, and
 - Engages in Professional Development.
- Copies of the City Manager and the City Attorney's more detailed performance criteria that were discussed with the Committee are attached.
- In addition, the Committee concurs with the City Manager and the City Attorney's recommendations to include multi-rater evaluations, including periodic evaluations by subordinates, peers, or people external to the City, to enhance the evaluation process.

• The results of these evaluations are confidential personnel files and may not be publicly released.

Governance & Accountability Committee Discussion

- At its meeting on March 24, 2014, the Committee discussed the evaluation process and recommended minor revisions.
- On April 28, 2014, the Committee voted unanimously (Howard, Mayfield, Autry, Kinsey, and Phipps) to recommend the process, outlined above, for approval by the City Council.
- On May 12, 2014, the City Council voted unanimously (Howard, Mayfield, Autry, Kinsey, and Phipps) to follow the process as recommended by the Governance & Accountability Committee.

Policy

As required by state law, the City of Charlotte adopts the annual appropriation and tax levy ordinance and considers related actions by July 1 of each fiscal year.

Background

- Since January 2014, the Mayor and the City Council held three Budget Workshops and the required Public Hearing to shape development of this budget. On May 5, the City Manager's Recommended Budget was presented. Additionally, the City Council held their Budget Adjustments meeting on May 14, and the Budget Straw Votes meeting on May 28.
- The Fiscal Year 2015 operating budget continues current service levels for dayto-day operations with few adjustments:
 - No change to the property tax rate;
 - Minimal increases to the General Fund in response to contract escalations, vehicle maintenance, technology maintenance and software licenses, streetlights, utilities, and business investment grants;
 - Modest pay plan for the employees who deliver City services as well as conversion of existing full-time temporary employees to regular status; and
 - Increases to Utility and Storm Water rates that reflect the cost of service and address infrastructure needs.
- The Fiscal Years 2015-2019 capital budget reflects the inclusion of a General Community Investment Plan to meet the needs of a growing community by focusing on livability, getting around, and job growth. The Enterprise Capital budgets respond to an aging infrastructure and growing service demands.

Approved Changes to the Manager's Recommended Budget from May 28 Council Straw Votes

- On May 28, 2014, the City Council approved the following budget amendments for the operating budget:
 - Amendment 1: Restore funding for Above & Beyond Students at their Fiscal Year 2014 level and provide funding for YWCA at their Fiscal Year 2013 level for a total additional amount of \$175,261 using eligible Fiscal Year 2015 federal Community Development Block Grant funds.

- Amendment 2: Increase Charlotte Regional Partnership operating funding by \$16,974 using City-County Interlocal Program Savings.
- Amendment 3: Add a Principal Planner position and associated operating costs to support preservation of Historic Districts in the amount of \$88,322 using City-County Interlocal Program Savings with the intent to develop a fee program to cover a portion or all of the associated costs in future fiscal years.

A. Adopt the Fiscal Year 2015 Operating Appropriations and Tax Levy Ordinance

Budget Overview

- The budget sustains essential services in community safety, the environment, transportation, housing and neighborhood development, economic development and global competitiveness, and the administrative support that they require.
- The total Fiscal Year 2015 budget is \$2.1 billion, with \$1.25 billion for operating expenditures and \$852.9 million for capital expenditures (all funds). The General Fund operating budget totals \$513.3 million (net of transfers).
- The total recommended budget includes the following key revenues:
 - No change to the property tax rate of 46.87¢;
 - Water and Sewer rates increase by 3.1%, or \$1.73 per month for the typical user;
 - Storm Water impervious surface fees increase by 3.0% for a typical home (24¢ per month); and
 - Charlotte Area Transit System base user fare increase of 20¢.

Property Tax Rate

• The property tax rate for Fiscal Year 2015 is 46.87¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation, with no changes from the prior year. The Fiscal Year 2015 assessed value is estimated at \$91.6 billion, with an estimated collection rate of 97.2%.

B. Adopt the Fiscal Years 2015-2019 Community Investment Plan Resolution

• The resolution approves the five-year Community Investment Plan expenditure and financing plan totaling \$4.1 billion (all funds).

General Fund Community Investment Plan

- The capital program is based on property tax rates as follows:
 - 9.67¢ for the Municipal Debt Service Fund, unchanged from the prior year; and
 - 1.20¢ for the Pay-As-You-Go Fund, unchanged from the prior year.
- The Fiscal Years 2015-2019 five-year General Community Investment Plan totals \$809.7 million, comprised of the following categories:
 - Housing and Neighborhood Development: \$260.7 million
 - Transportation: \$268.4 million
 - Economic Development: \$116.7 million
 - Environmental Services: \$16.6 million
 - Facility Investments: \$147.3 million
- The General Community Investment Plan is supported by three of four proposed bond referenda in 2014, 2016, and 2018 (the fourth bond referenda in 2020 will be reflected in future five-year Community Investment Plans beginning in Fiscal Year 2016 for a total recommended General capital debt package of \$816.4 million).

Enterprise-Funded Community Investment Plans

- Enterprise programs are financially self-sustaining and do not rely on property tax or general government revenues.
- Charlotte Area Transit System totals \$1.2 billion and is funded by federal and state grants and the one half-cent sales tax for transit.
- Aviation totals \$1.3 billion and is funded by \$854.8 million in revenue bonds, \$112.7 million in Federal Aviation Administration grants, \$33.0 million in Transportation Security Administration funding, and \$274.4 million in cash.
- Storm Water totals \$267.9 million and is funded by \$180.5 million in cash and \$87.4 million in revenue bonds.
- Utility Department (Water and Sewer) totals \$609.9 million and is funded by \$203.5 million in cash and \$406.4 million in revenue bonds.

C. Approve the Fiscal Year 2015 Storm Water Interlocal Agreement

- In accordance with the Interlocal Agreement on storm water services, this action will inform the County of the amount to be charged for the City's portion of the fee. The County Commission will vote on storm water fee changes on June 17.
- The current long-range plan for the storm water program includes annual increases in the City's storm water fee in order to finance the ongoing response to new and backlogged citizen requests for service.
- The fees for Fiscal Year 2015 maintain the existing two-tier methodology and increase fees by 3.0% from Fiscal Year 2014 to Fiscal Year 2015:

- The 3.0% fee increase will result in additional revenue of \$1.4 million in Fiscal Year 2015.
- In accordance with the Interlocal Agreement on storm water services, the Mecklenburg County Board of Commissioners conducted a public hearing on changes to the City's portion of the storm water fee on May 20, 2014. The City Council also conducted a public hearing on storm water fees in conjunction with the Fiscal Year 2015 budget public hearing on May 14, 2014.

D. Adopt the Fiscal Year 2015 Employee Pay and Benefits Plan Resolution and associated Human Resources contracts

• The recommendations included in the Fiscal Year 2015 Pay and Benefits Report include the following:

Pay Plans

- In the Public Safety Pay Plan, the budget includes the following:
 - 2.5% or 5.0% step adjustments; and
 - 1.5% market adjustment.
- In the Broadbanding Pay Plan, the recommended budget includes a 3% merit pool.

Benefits

- The City contribution to group health insurance increases only 2% due to the City's commitment to the City Council adopted philosophy of: aggressive cost management for benefits, employees expected to fairly share in the cost of benefits, moderate level of benefits and pay, and proactive support of wellness programs to reduce future costs.
- The following plan design and premium changes, which are being evaluated and will become effective January 1, 2015, include:
 - Employee and Retiree Medical
 - Reducing the in-network individual and family out-of-pocket maximums in the medical and prescription drug plans to comply with the maximums

- as outlined in the Patient Protection and Affordable Healthcare Act.

 Currently the medical benefit plan is administered by Blue Cross Blue Shield of North Carolina. The City Manager or his designee is authorized to either renegotiate or rebid the current contract. If the contract is rebid, the City Manager or his designee is authorized to select a vendor and execute the contract and future contract amendments with the selected vendor upon completion of the bid process.
- The City Manager is authorized to approve changes including plan options, vendors, and future contracts/contract amendments to the fully insured medical and prescription drug plans for Medicare eligible retirees.
- Since the plans for Medicare eligible retirees are fully insured, the City Manager/designee is authorized to approve cost sharing changes, vendor changes, and rate increases as necessary to appropriately fund these plans upon receipt of renewal rates from AmWINS Group, Inc. (wholesale insurance company).
- o 2% increase in City's cost for group insurance coverages.
- 5.2% total medical premium increase in both the Plus PPO and Basic PPO Plans.
- o Premiums increase as outlined in the following table:

- Effective July 1, 2014, it is recommended that the surviving spouse provision for Public Safety Officers be applied to Non-Public Safety Officers so all employees killed in the line of duty are covered under the same provision regarding the surviving spouse's option to continue medical coverage.
- The City is currently reviewing and rebidding services. Approval of Action D. authorizes the City Manager/designee to execute the following:
 - o Employee Assistance Program: Upon completion of a rebidding process, select a vendor and execute the contract and future contract amendments with the selected vendor upon completion of the bid process.
 - Benefits Consulting Services: Amend the current contract with Willis of North Carolina for two additional, one-year terms (2015 and 2016).

17. Business Privilege License Tax City Code Amendment

Action:

Adopt an Ordinance amending Chapter 13 of the City Code to conform with recent legislative changes to the City's Business Privilege License Tax authority and to move the due date and imposition of penalties and interest back 30 days for Fiscal Years 2014 and 2015.

Staff Resource(s): Greg Gaskins, Finance

Bob Hagemann, City Attorney's Office

Explanation

- On May 29, 2014, the General Assembly ratified and Governor McCrory signed House Bill 1050 (S.L. 2014-3) which, among other things:
 - Reenacted the authority of cities to levy privilege license taxes, which authority was inadvertently repealed during the 2013 legislative session;
 - Imposed a new limitation for the 2014-2015 tax year that limits the applicability of privilege license taxes to businesses that are physically located within the City; and
 - Repeals the authority of cities to levy privilege license taxes (with certain limited exceptions) effective for taxable years beginning on or after July 1, 2015.
- Given the inadvertent repeal during the last legislative session, the County Tax Collector did not mail 2014-2015 tax bills in mid-May as has been the practice.
- Now that the authority has been reenacted, the Tax Collector will be sending bills to businesses still subject to the tax. However, the timing of the mailing will not provide a fair opportunity for businesses to pay the tax by July 1 and thereby avoid penalties and interest for late payment.
- In light of the foregoing, the proposed ordinance would:
 - Conform to the description of who must pay the tax to the new statutory provision that limits the applicability to businesses that are physically located in the City;
 - Establish July 31, 2014, as the due date for 2014-2015 taxes; and
 - Provide that taxes paid after August 1, 2014, would be subject to additional taxes for late payment.

18. Charlotte Transit Center - Transfer of Ownership

Action:

- A. Authorize the City Manager to execute all documents required to dissolve the non-profit corporation known as Charlotte Transit Center, Inc., (the "Corporation") and to transfer all assets, liabilities, and obligations of the Corporation to the City, and
- B. Authorize the City Manager to negotiate and execute a contract with Lincoln Harris, in an amount not to exceed \$195,000, to provide property management services for the Charlotte Transit Center for Fiscal Year 2015.

Staff Resource(s): Carolyn Flowers, CATS John Muth, CATS

Explanation

- On September 28, 1994, the City and NationsBank formed a non-profit Corporation to build and operate a public transportation terminal, the Charlotte Transit Center (CTC).
- The City provided the land and continuing contributions for transit-related expenses of the CTC, and NationsBank provided the funding for construction and continuing contributions for the retail-related expenses of the CTC.
- The Corporation's Board of Directors now consists of two representatives from Bank of America (as successor to NationsBank) and two representatives from the City/Charlotte Area Transit System (CATS).
- The Board of Directors generally meets at least twice per year to discuss operations at the CTC and to adopt the annual budget.
- The Corporation manages the property through a property manager, Lincoln Harris, that is responsible for:
 - Administration of tenant leases, including addressing tenant service requests and finding retail tenants;
 - Management of the day-to-day operations of the CTC, with oversight and participation by CATS' Facilities Management Department; and
 - Administration of vendor contracts for services such as heating, ventilation, and air conditioning maintenance, pest control, and exterior lighting.
- City staff has been directly involved with the CTC both due to the presence on the Board of Directors and due to the importance of the CTC as the main operating facility for passengers using the transit system.
- As allowed in the corporate bylaws, the Bank now desires to resign from the Corporation as management of a transportation facility is not part of the Bank's core business. The CTC can be operated by the City without a corporate management structure. Therefore, in anticipation of dissolution of the Corporation, the City/CATS has performed a due diligence process, both in terms of the building itself and in terms of the financial condition of the Corporation.
- The CTC was physically inspected by an engineering consultant retained by the City; no significant issues were identified.
- The Corporation has incurred no long-term liabilities and has a capital/operating reserve of approximately \$800,000 that transfers with the asset. The reserve will be available to the City for future use to maintain the CTC.

- The Corporation can be dissolved and all existing tenant leases, vendor contracts, agreements and accounts, including the property deed, can be transferred or assigned to the City by the start of Fiscal Year 2015.
 - Not including City departments, currently, nine retail tenants occupy CTC, which is detailed in the chart below.

- In order to achieve a seamless management transition, City staff recommends partnering with Lincoln Harris for leasing and day-to-day management of the CTC until the end of Fiscal Year 2015.
 - This will allow sufficient time for the City staff to determine whether the dayto-day management of the property, including the leasing of the retail portion of the CTC, should be assumed by the City, or if the leasing and management of the CTC should be part of a future competitive bid process.
- The cost of the one-year contract with Lincoln Harris will be paid from CTC revenue/CATS budget. CATS Fiscal Year 2015 operating and capital budgets anticipate the transfer of the CTC as outlined above, which was approved by the Metropolitan Transit Commission on April 23, 2014, and the City Council on May 27, 2014.
- The transfer should not impact day-to-day transit services, transit riders, or CTC tenants.

19. General Obligation Bond Referendum

Action: Adopt resolutions authorizing staff to proceed with the necessary actions to conduct a general obligation bond

referendum on November 4, 2014.

Staff Resource(s): Greg Gaskins, Finance

Explanation

• The City Council is scheduled to adopt the Fiscal Year 2015 budgets and Fiscal Years 2015-2019 Community Investment Plan at tonight's meeting, which includes a \$145,965,000 bond referendum on November 4, 2014.

- The referendum total is \$1,000 more than the total appropriation of \$145,964,000 due to the requirement to approve bonds in \$5,000 increments.
- The referendum includes \$110,965,000 of street bonds, \$20,000,000 of neighborhood improvement bonds, and \$15,000,000 of housing bonds.
- The statutory requirements for the legal process include applying to the Local Government Commission for approval, holding a public hearing on the proposed bond orders, setting of the special referendum, and certification of the results.
- The current action is the first of four City Council actions. This first action will specifically authorize:
 - Publication of a notice of intent to apply to the Local Government Commission,
 - Application to the Local Government Commission, and
 - Certain statements of facts concerning the proposed bonds.

Next Steps

- On June 23, 2014, the bond orders will be introduced, and the City Council will be asked to set a public hearing on the bond orders for July 28.
- On July 28, the City Council will be asked to hold a public hearing on each of the bond orders, approve the bond orders (including the form and language of the ballot), and set a special bond referendum.
- After November 4, the City Council will be asked to adopt a resolution certifying and declaring the results of the special bond referendum. This action will occur after the Mecklenburg Board of Elections certifies the results of the vote.

Introduction to CONSENT

<u>Consent</u> consists of routine items that have been approved in the budget. Price lists for unit price contracts are available upon request.



In April 2013, the City Council voted to replace the City's Small Business Opportunity (SBO) Program with the Charlotte Business INClusion program. On July 1, 2013, the City phased in the Charlotte Business INClusion program into all of its practices and procedures.

The Charlotte Business INClusion program seeks to promote diversity, inclusion, and local business opportunities in the City's contracting and procurement process for Minority, Women, and Small Business Enterprises (MWSBEs) headquartered in the Charlotte Combined Statistical Area. Participation of Minority, Women, or Small Business Enterprises (MBE, WBE, or SBE) is noted where applicable.

For a period of time during Fiscal Year 2014, projects appearing in the Council Agendas will incorporate Policy references for either the current Charlotte Business INClusion program or the Small Business Opportunity Program.

The applicable Charlotte Business INClusion program Policy or the Small Business Opportunity Program policy sections are referenced at the end of the Council Request for Council Action.

Disadvantaged Business Enterprise

Disadvantaged Business Enterprise is a federal program primarily used for Aviation and Transit.

Contractors and Consultants

All contractor and consultant selections follow the Council-approved process unless described otherwise. For the procurement of professional services and/or engineering, architectural, and surveying services, the North Carolina General Statutes 143-64.31 requires that units of government "select firms qualified to provide such services on the basis of demonstrated competence and qualification...without regard to fee other than unit price information, and therefore to negotiate a contract for those services at a fair and reasonable fee with the best qualified firm."

The property transaction process following the City Council approval for condemnation is referenced at the end of Consent.

24. Boulevard Homes (Renaissance) Phase III Bond Issuance Approval

Action: Adopt a resolution granting the Charlotte Housing Authority's

request to issue multi-family housing revenue bonds to finance the development of mixed-income housing as part of Phase III of the Boulevard Homes (Renaissance) Hope VI redevelopment

plan.

Staff Resource(s): Pamela Wideman, Neighborhood & Business Services Zelleka Biermann, Neighborhood & Business Services

Explanation

- The Charlotte Housing Authority (CHA) is requesting the City adopt a resolution authorizing the issuance of multi-family housing revenue bonds for Renaissance Phase III, a mixed-income, multi-family development.
- The CHA bonds, not to exceed \$10,000,000, will be used to finance a portion of the construction of the development.
- Approval of this request is required by the governmental unit having jurisdiction over the area where the development is located to satisfy Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 and will not impact the proposed Community Investment Plan.
- CHA partnered with Laurel Street Residential, LLC to develop and build the Renaissance, including Phase III of the project.
- The Renaissance, a mixed-income community, is located at the intersection of West Boulevard and Billy Graham Parkway.
- Phases I and II are complete and 100% occupied. Phase III will consist of 150 mixed-income housing units. Phase III is scheduled to be complete by the end of 2015.
- The overall estimated redevelopment costs are \$105,000,000.

Background

- In 2010, the United States Housing and Urban Development Department (HUD) awarded the CHA a Hope VI grant, in the amount of \$20,900,000, for the Renaissance revitalization project.
- On August 22, 2011, the City Council approved \$12,000,000 to assist with the redevelopment of the Renaissance. The City Council approved \$5,000,000 of Housing Trust Fund dollars for housing and \$7,000,000 for infrastructure.

Action: Adopt a budget ordinance appropriating \$251,000 in assets forfeiture funds for law enforcement projects

Staff Resource(s): Sherie Pearsall, Police

Explanation

- State and federal law permits local law enforcement agencies to use their share of the proceeds from forfeited assets to fund law enforcement related programs and equipment.
- The request is to appropriate \$251,000 in assets forfeiture funds for three law enforcement programs.
 - \$136,000 will be used for a partnership with Veterans Affairs.
 - o Police will contract with Veterans Affairs to provide four wounded veterans work in the Real Time Crime Center for a term of one year.
 - The partnership will provide the opportunity for four wounded veterans to learn new skills as part of their transition into the civilian workforce.
 - \$90,000 will fund a contract with Information Builders to develop administrative dashboards for Internal Affairs, Human Resources, Fiscal Affairs, and Risk Management.
 - These dashboards will include data that will be used for making accurate and consistent decisions with real time information.
 - The dashboards will be a useful management tool for monitoring the Department's performance in critical areas and developing strategies that ensure that departmental goals are met.

- The NC 911 Board distributes funds collected through the state's 911 service charge to Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP).
- The Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Department is a primary PSAP for answering 911 calls. The Mecklenburg Emergency Medical Services Agency (Medic) and the Charlotte Fire Department are secondary PSAP agencies.
- The NC 911 Board is creating a new program that will distribute funds to secondary agencies through their primary agency.
 - The Board is requiring all PSAPs, with a secondary agency in the 911 system, to enter into a contract in order to implement the secondary funding program.
- The NC 911 Board is also requiring an Interlocal Agreement between the primary and secondary agencies in the same system to define and assign responsibilities for answering and responding to 911 calls.
 - This Agreement must be signed by the Executive Director of the NC 911 Board.
 - An agreement between Police and Fire has been developed; it does not require approval by the City Council.
- The NC 911 Board determines the amount of funding provided to secondary agencies by a formula-based on-call volume to each individual agency.
- Funding to secondary agencies will not affect funding for the primary agency.

traffic calming and miscellaneous engineering services.

Explanation

 On June 27, 2011, the City Council approved a contract with AECOM Technical Services of North Carolina, Inc. to provide planning and engineering design services related to innovative traffic calming.

- Innovative traffic calming tools include traffic circles, curb extensions, bumpouts, and pavement markings to delineate alternate street uses, such as onstreet parking and bicycle lanes.
- Traffic calming projects are typically identified in response to citizen requests and traffic/speed studies.
- Anticipated tasks include innovative traffic calming plans for local streets and thoroughfares, public involvement, and the development of a Charlotte Traffic Calming Manual.
 - The first task of this contract was to develop an innovative traffic calming concept for Scaleybark Road, a minor thoroughfare, between Conway Avenue and Woodlawn Road to include curb extension, raised medians, on street parking, and bicycle lanes.
 - City staff held a four-day design workshop with the public in August 2011, and staff developed a basic concept for the traffic calming project.
- Contract amendment #2, in the amount of \$125,000, will provide funds for engineering services to accommodate the following issues identified during the design phase:
 - Provide design services during the real estate phase;
 - Incorporate additional community engagement opportunities;
 - Identify storm water design deficiencies related to the street improvements and design any modifications that may be needed with the traffic calming work; and
 - Replace and relocate approximately 2,000 feet of 4-inch and 2-inch water main currently located under existing pavement along the west side of Scaleybark Road.
 - Street improvements such as this traffic calming project often require the upgrade of existing utility infrastructure, including water, sewer, and storm drainage systems as part of the overall work. Any needed utility upgrades, as identified by Charlotte-Mecklenburg Utility Department (CMUD) or Storm Water Services, are routinely incorporated into these general capital projects while the street is under construction.
 - The cost of the water main and sewer upgrades will be reimbursed by CMUD.
- On June 27, 2011, the City Council approved the original planning and design contract for traffic calming services of various streets including Scaleybark Road in the amount of \$200,000.
- On April 25, 2013, the City Manager approved contract amendment #1, in the amount of \$65,000, for the design of approximately 2,000 linear feet of sidewalk and additional design services for Scaleybark Road.
- The new total contract value including the amendments is \$390,000.

 - If the contractor can complete two key milestones ahead of schedule, a total of \$30,000 is potentially available and included in this award amount.
- The project is part of the Prosperity Village Interchange System and is funded from prior approved Community Investment Plan funds.
- Funding for this project is unrelated to the Prosperity Church Road Northwest Arc funding, which the City Council approved on July 22, 2013.
- Construction is expected to be complete by fourth-quarter 2014 in conjunction with the opening of Interstate-485.

Piggybacking Exemption

- G.S. 143-129(g) allows local governments to purchase from any supplier that has, within the past 12 months, contracted to furnish the item to any federal, state or local agency.
- The contract must be one that was entered into following a public, formal bid process substantially similar to the one set forth in the North Carolina statutes, and the vendor must be willing to provide the items to the City at the same or more favorable terms.

Explanation

- The Charlotte Department of Transportation (CDOT) currently manages the City's on-street parking program, which provides approximately 1,100 on-street spaces in Uptown, SouthEnd, and the Elizabeth areas.
- CDOT is planning to replace the existing single-space, on-street parking equipment with new solar powered, credit card enabled, single-space meters. The current, coin only parking meters are 17 years old and regularly failing.
- Each new smart parking meter has a web-based management system that can be retrofitted into the current single-spaced meter housings.
- The new smart parking meter management system can be monitored and managed remotely.
- The prices are set forth in the proposed contract, and are available upon request.
- CDOT anticipates purchasing up to 1,000 Smart Meters over the term of the contract as follows:
 - Initial year one equipment investment for the purchase of up to 700 Smart Meters, at a total investment of \$332,500, to place meters in high-demand locations.

- Annual wireless gateway/data fees and credit card transaction processing fees are estimated to be \$164.40 per meter annually.
- Additional smart parking meters are \$475.00 each, which includes shipping, installation, and training.
- The new smart parking meters are anticipated to be installed during the first quarter of Fiscal Year 2015.

Background

- The City of San Rafael, CA issued a Request for Proposals on June 10, 2013, and awarded a contract to IPS Group, Inc. on November 18, 2013.
- Procurement Management and CDOT have reviewed the process used by the City of San Rafael and confirmed that it was substantially similar to the formal bid process required by the North Carolina bid statute.
- Through an informal quote process, Procurement Management evaluated the competitiveness of the San Rafael pricing, which IPS Group, Inc. has committed to provide to the City per the requirements laid out for the use of the piggybacking exception.
- In addition, CDOT has researched other existing IPS Group, Inc. contracts to evaluate client satisfaction with the products and services, which yielded positive results.

- The Airport's terminal building and other facilities require extensive communications systems that provide data and information to tenants, passengers, and Aviation Department staff. These systems are expanding as the facilities expand.

DB Consulting was selected by a three-member selection committee comprised of Aviation Department staff on May 7, 2014. DB Consulting was selected based on their extensive experience with the Airport's communications structure, having worked at the Airport since 2000.

Explanation

- The Fleet Management Division uses outside service providers for the provision of hydraulic pressure hose repair and replacement services for a broad variety of vehicles and equipment.
- These repair services reduce operational costs by minimizing equipment downtime through service level agreements included in the contract.
- The selected company will be responsible for providing services either onsite at Fleet Management locations or at remote "roadside" locations within Mecklenburg County.
- The company will be compensated for each service performed at a negotiated price schedule as stated in the contract.
- Total contract expenditures are estimated to be \$350,000 annually over the fiveyear term.

Selection Process

- The City issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) on April 10, 2014, for hydraulic pressure hose repair and replacement services; two proposals were received from interested service providers.
- The Project Team, consisting of staff from the Procurement Management and Fleet Management, evaluated the proposals and recommends awarding the contract to Pirtek South End as the service provider best meeting the City's needs in terms of qualifications, experience, and cost effectiveness.

No SBE goal was set for this contract because there are no subcontracting opportunities (Part C: Section 2.1(a) of the Charlotte Business INClusion Policy).

34. Citywide Uniform Rentals and Other Related Services

Action:

- A. Approve a unit price contract with Rental Uniform Services of Statesville, Inc., dba Sunshine Uniform Service for uniform rentals and other related services for an initial term of three years, and
- B. Authorize the City Manager to approve one, three-year renewal option contingent upon the company's satisfactory performance.

Staff Resource(s): Marie Harris, Shared Services

Explanation

- Various City departments use a service provider to supply uniforms and other related garments via a rental program, including:
 - Provision of rental garments meeting a variety of City specifications, including standard field garments, supervisory garments, flame-resistant garments, and high-visibility garments;
 - Provision of mats, dust mops, shop rags, lockers, soiled garment bins;
 - Weekly laundering of all uniforms, and delivery and pick-up at various City facilities;
 - Repair or replacement of damaged or lost uniforms; and
 - Additional pricing discounts for direct purchase of uniforms, including logo apparel.
- The company will be compensated for the services per the negotiated uniform rental price schedule as stated in the contract.
- The contract does not include Police and Fire uniforms.
- Estimated expenditures are \$750,000 annually.

Selection Process

- The City issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) on March 14, 2014, for uniform rental services; three proposals were received from interested service providers.
- The Project Team, consisting of staff from Procurement Management and various City departments, including Fleet Management, the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Department, Charlotte Area Transit System, Charlotte Department of Transportation, and Charlotte-Mecklenburg Utility Department, evaluated the proposals and recommends awarding the contract to Rental Uniform Services of Statesville, Inc., dba Sunshine Uniform Service, as best meeting the City's needs in terms of qualifications, experience, and cost effectiveness.

Charlotte Business INClusion

For service based contracts, the City negotiates M/W/SBE goals after the proposal selection process (Part C: Section 2.1(h) of the Charlotte Business INClusion Policy). For this project, Sunshine Uniform Service has committed 2.00% (\$15,000) annually of the total contract amount to the following WBE: Earl Tindol Ford, Inc. (fleet vehicles, parts, and service). Sunshine Uniform Service is also a certified WBE.

Explanation

- On December 9, 2013, the City Council authorized the City Manager to negotiate and sign a contract closeout agreement with Alcatel-Lucent effectively ending the original Broadband Technology Opportunity Program (BTOP) grant program.
 - The contract with Alcatel-Lucent was for the design, implementation, and maintenance of a countywide wireless broadband network.
 - Prior to suspension of the grant by the U.S. Department of Commerce in May 2012, Alcatel-Lucent had already delivered a substantial quantity of telecommunications equipment to the City in preparation for deployment.
 - Pursuant to the closeout agreement with Alcatel-Lucent, the City agreed to accept and take title to equipment that had already been delivered, valued at approximately \$2,529,166.
 - o All of the equipment was paid for from BTOP grant funding (\$1,759,414) or donated by Alcatel-Lucent as an in-kind match (\$769,752) according to the terms of the grant and the Alcatel-Lucent contract.
- On January 13, 2014, the City Council approved an agreement to restructure the BTOP grant to improve public safety communications technology and infrastructure. The program will enhance the speed and capacity of the City's network infrastructure and enable the public safety entities to have greater access to real-time video as well as critical operational information.
 - The restructured grant agreement originally included a provision that some microwave telecommunications equipment would be re-purposed, with the intention that the remaining equipment would be donated to the First Responder Network Authority (FirstNet).
 - FirstNet is a new federal agency created to deploy and manage a national public safety wireless broadband network, and is an independent authority within the federal National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA). NTIA is the federal agency administering the grant.
 - In the interim, the City and NTIA have agreed that the microwave portion of the grant would not move forward, meaning that none of the equipment delivered by Alcatel-Lucent can now be re-purposed by the City.
 - The federal grant requires that the equipment be used for a BTOP-related project.
- The City has negotiated with NTIA for the City to donate all of the equipment to FirstNet, with the exception of batteries, which are past their shelf life and will be disposed of separately.
- North Carolina G.S. 160A-280 requires that City Council adopt a resolution approving all donations. A list of the equipment to be donated is attached to this Agenda item.

Part A: Administration & Enforcement

Appendix Section 18: Contract: For the purposes of establishing an SBE subcontracting goal on a Contract, the following are examples of contract types:

- Any agreement through which the City procures services from a Business Enterprise, other than Exempt Contracts.
- Contracts include agreements and purchase orders for (a) construction, re-construction, alteration and remodeling; (b) architectural work, engineering, testing, construction management and other professional services related to construction; and (c) services of any nature (including but not limited to general consulting and technology-related services).
- Contracts do not include agreements or purchase orders for the purchase or lease of apparatus, supplies, goods, or equipment.
- The term "Contract" shall also include Exempt Contracts for which an SBE Goal has been set.
- Financial Partner Agreements, Development Agreements, and Construction Manager-at-Risk Agreements shall also be deemed "Contracts," but shall be subject to the provisions referenced in the respective Parts of the SBO Program Policy.

Appendix Section 23: Exempt Contracts: Contracts that fall within one or more of the following categories shall be "Exempt Contracts" for the purposes of establishing an SBE subcontracting goal, unless the Department responsible for procuring the Contract decides otherwise:

- **23.1. Informal Contracts.** Informal Contracts shall be Exempt Contracts. (See Appendix Section 29 for a definition of Informal Contracts)
- **23.2. No Competitive Process Contracts:** Contracts or purchase orders that are entered into without a competitive process, or entered into based on a competitive process administered by an entity other than the City shall be Exempt Contracts, including but not limited to contracts that are entered into by sole sourcing, piggybacking, buying off the North Carolina State contract, buying from a competitive bidding group purchasing program as allowed under G.S. 143-129(e)(3), or using the emergency procurement procedures established by the North Carolina General Statutes.
- **23.3. Managed Competition Contracts:** Managed competition contracts pursuant to which a City Department or division competes with Business Enterprises to perform a City function shall be Exempt Contracts.

- **23.4. Real Estate Leasing and Acquisition Contracts:** Contracts for the acquisition or lease of real estate shall be Exempt Contracts.
- **23.5. Federal Contracts Subject to DBE Requirements:** Contracts that are subject to the U.S. Department of Transportation Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Program as set forth in 49 CFR Part 26 or any successor legislation shall be Exempt Contracts.
- **23.6. State Contracts Subject to MWBE Requirements:** Contracts for which a minority and women business participation goal is set pursuant to G.S. 143-128.2(a) due to a building project receiving funding from the State of North Carolina shall be Exempt Contracts.
- **23.7. Financial Partner Agreements with DBE or MWBE Requirements:** Contracts that are subject to a disadvantaged business development program or minority and women business development program maintained by a Financial Partner shall be Exempt Contracts.
- **23.8. Interlocal Agreements:** Contracts with other units of federal, state, or local government shall be Exempt Contracts.
- **23.9. Contracts for Legal Services:** Contracts for legal services shall be Exempt Contracts, unless otherwise indicated by the City Attorney.
- **23.10. Contracts with Waivers:** Contracts for which the SBO Program Manager or the City Manager waives the SBO Program requirements shall be Exempt Contracts (such as when there are no SBE subcontracting opportunities on a Contract).
- **23.11. Special Exemptions:** Contracts where the Department and the Program Manager agree that the Department had no discretion to hire an SBE (e.g., emergency contracts or contracts for banking or insurance services) shall be Exempt Contracts.
- **Appendix Section 29: Informal Contracts:** Contracts and purchase orders through which the City procures services from a Business Enterprise that fall within one of the following two categories:
- **29.1. Construction Contracts Less Than or Equal To \$200,000:** Contracts for construction or repair work that are estimated to require a total expenditure of City funds less than or equal to \$200,000.
- **29.2. Service Contracts That Are Less Than or Equal To \$100,000:** Service Contracts that are estimated to require a total expenditure of City funds less than or equal to \$100,000.

Part B: Formal Construction Bidding

<u>Part B: Section 2.1:</u> When the City Solicitation Documents for a Construction Contract contain an SBE Goal, each Bidder must either: (a) meet the SBE Goal, or (b) comply with the Good Faith Negotiation and Good Faith Efforts requirements. Failure to do so constitutes grounds for rejection of the Bid. The City Solicitation Documents will contain certain forms that Bidders must complete to document having met these requirements.

Additionally, the City may negotiate a Committed SBE Goal with the successful Proposer after the Proposal Opening.

Part C: Section 2.4: No SBE Goal When There Are No SBE Subcontracting Opportunities. The City shall not establish an SBE Goal for Service Contracts where there are no SBEs certified to perform the scopes of work that the City regards as realistic opportunities for subcontracting.

Part D: Post Contract Award Requirements

<u>Part D: Section 6:</u> New Subcontractor Opportunities/Additions to Scope, Contract Amendments

If a Contractor elects to subcontract any portion of a Contract that the Contractor did not previously identify to the City as a subcontracting opportunity, or if the scope of work on a Contract increases for any reason in a manner that creates a new SBE subcontracting opportunity, the City shall either:

- Notify the Contractor that there will be no Supplemental SBE Goal for the new work; or
- Establish and notify the Contractor of a Supplemental SBE Goal for the new work.

41. Reference - Property Transaction Process

Property Transaction Process Following Council Approval for Condemnation

The following overview is intended to provide further explanation for the process of property transactions that are approved by City Council for condemnation.

Approximately six weeks of preparatory work is required before the condemnation lawsuit is filed. During this time, City staff continues to negotiate with the property owner in an effort to reach a mutual settlement.

- If a settlement is reached, the condemnation process is stopped, and the property transaction proceeds to a real estate closing.
- If a settlement cannot be reached, the condemnation lawsuit is filed. Even after filing, negotiations continue between the property owner and the City's legal representative. Filing of the condemnation documents allows:
 - The City to gain access and title to the subject property so the capital project can proceed on schedule.
 - The City to deposit the appraised value of the property in an escrow account with the Clerk of Court. These funds may be withdrawn by the property owner immediately upon filing, and at any time thereafter, with the understanding that additional funds transfer may be required at the time of final settlement or at the conclusion of litigation.
- If a condemnation lawsuit is filed, the final trial may not occur for 18 to 24 months; however, a vast majority of the cases settle prior to final trial. The City's condemnation attorney remains actively engaged with the property owner to continue negotiations throughout litigation.
 - North Carolina law requires that all condemnation cases go through formal nonbinding mediation, at which an independent certified mediator attempts to facilitate a successful settlement. For the minority of cases that do not settle, the property owner has the right to a trial by judge or jury in order to determine the amount of compensation the property owner will receive.

ZONING COMMITTEE ACTION

- 2. Amended note 4a to specify a maximum proposed building height of 44 feet, which is more restrictive than the 45 feet requested by staff.
- 3. Placed an X over note 5c; the note will be removed completely with final plan submission.
- 4. Amended note 6a to reflect the amount of tree save provided as specified in the Development Data on sheet 2/3.
- 5. Provided additional building articulation and step downs along the southeastern and northern building façades.
- 6. Revised the Site Section A-A to reflect the current site design.
- 7. Deleted references to Lots A and B in the data table and amended site acreage under the data table to show the proposed acres to remain R-3 and proposed acres to be rezoned.
- 8. Amended the Providence/Kuykendall perspective drawing and explained it is for representational purposes and to refer to the preliminary landscape plan for exact trees and plantings.
- 9. Clarified the use of vinyl by stating the prohibition will not include soffits and windows.
- 10. Added a note to each sign location on the landscape plan stating that they will be subject to a separate permit.
- 11. Added the required eight-foot planting strip along Providence Road to the Preliminary Landscape Plan.
- 12. Amended note 8a to limit the height of freestanding lights to 16 feet, which is more restrictive than the 20 feet requested by staff.
- 13. Clarified "non-peak hours" by specifying the hours of 7am-9am and 4pm-6pm.

- 14. Added the proposed CATS waiting pad to the Preliminary Landscape Plan.
- Removed the "Undisturbed Natural Area" label located on the lower edge of the Preliminary Landscape Plan at the Kuykendall driveway.
- 16. ZONING COMMITTEE DISCUSSION

One commissioner stated they felt the proposed building was out of scale for the area and that they also had concerns that the amount of grading would eliminate the existing trees. They said the trees shown in the plan would take many years to grow to appear as they do in the images provided. Even though there is a lot of land between the building and the neighborhood to the rear, the building sits up on a hill and it will be visible to those neighbors. The commissioner continued by saying it seemed that this was just a building from somewhere else that was placed on the site. It does not relate to the site in terms of grading, context, mass and location of parking. This commissioner felt the use is needed in Charlotte but the project does not fit the area.

Another commissioner said one of her considerations was the site was 10 acres and large portion is being reserved. This development does not create the traffic issues that other types of development could create. Charlotte Latin is a large facility but it is also on a large site. The commissioner felt this was the best use for the site.

One commissioner's concern was the visual impact of the building from a driver's perspective going down Providence Road. Another commissioner asked staff about the justification of the massing of the building. Staff responded by explaining that the zoning for Charlotte Latin would allow buildings up to 40 feet and this building is limited to 44 feet. Additionally, the site is 10 acres with the building pushed up to the street and away from the single family homes, thus reducing the impact to the homes. The large tree save area and preserved and proposed trees provide a buffer to the neighboring homes and visual barrier.

One commissioner stated they struggled with the design even though the land use is appropriate. Another commissioner said one thing that made a difference was the project would have a lesser impact on traffic than other uses. MINORITY OPINION The minority of the Zoning Committee felt the proposed building was

out of scale and context for the area and expressed concerned about the impact the grading would have on the existing trees. Newly planted trees would take years to grow and, due to the elevation difference, would leave the proposed building exposed to the neighborhood to the

rear.

STAFF OPINION Staff agrees with the recommendation of the majority of the Zoning

Committee.

ENVIRONMENTALLY SENSITIVE SITE DESIGN (see full department reports online)

- **Site Design:** The following explains how the petition addresses the environmentally sensitive site design guidance in the *General Development Policies-Environment*.
 - Protects environmentally sensitive areas by providing a large, undisturbed tree save area that exceeds the minimum Zoning Ordinance standards. Splits the site's stormwater runoff into separate stormwater facilities and creek drainage basins.
 - Minimizes impacts to the natural environment by concentrating the building footprint and parking areas close to the front of the site allowing the rear of the property to be left undeveloped.
 - Facilitates the use of alternative modes of transportation by providing a CATS bus stop along Providence Road.

OUTSTANDING ISSUES

- The petitioner should:
 - 1. Amend note 2a to refer to Section 9.503 and specify the type of "Home for the Aged" units as dependent units.

- 2. Amend note 4a to specify a maximum proposed building height of 45 feet.
- 3. Remove note 5c.
- 4. Amend Note 6a to reflect the amount of tree save provided as specified in the Development Data on sheet 2/3.
- 5. Provide additional building articulation and step downs along the southeastern and northern building façades.
- 6. Revise the Site Section A-A to reflect the current site design.
- 7. Delete reference to Lots A and B in the data table and amend site acreage under the data table to show the proposed acres to remain R-3 and proposed acres to be rezoned.
- 8. Amend the Providence/Kuykendall perspective drawing to reflect any preserved trees and landscaping provided as shown on the Preliminary Landscape Plan.
- Clarify the prohibition of the use of vinyl by stating if the prohibition will or will not include soffits and windows.
- 10. Remove the signs from the preliminary landscape plan and all renderings, as signs will be permitted separately.
- 11. Show the required eight-foot planting strip along Providence Road on the Preliminary Landscape Plan.
- 12. Amend note 8a to limit the height of freestanding lights to 20 feet.
- 13. Clarify "non-peak hours" by providing times.
- 14. Show the proposed CATS waiting pad on the Preliminary Landscape Plan.
- 15. Remove the "Undisturbed Natural Area" label located on the lower edge of the Preliminary Landscape Plan at the Kuykendall driveway.
- 16. Clarify the conflict between the "Undisturbed Natural Area" labels and the 46-foot Class "C" buffer that is being planted along the northern property line in common with the abutting property.
- 17. Label the feature around and extending from the covered well to the sidewalk along Kuykendall Road shown on the lower right hand corner of the Preliminary Landscape Plan.
- Amend site plan to reflect a required 50-foot Class C buffer instead of the 46-foot Class C buffer shown.
- 19. Remove unneeded sheets in the site plan packet.

1. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- a.) Future amendments to the conditional site plan development standards may be applied for by the then Owner of the parcel or parcels involved, in accordance with 6.207 of the Charlotte Zoning Ordinance.
- 2. PERMITTED USES
- a.) Proposed Zoning shall be limited to 'Home for the Aged' as described in Section 9.503 of the Charlotte Zoning Ordinance. This use shall be dependent units, except for the two independent units for management staff only, not for rental purposes.
- 3. TRANSPORTATION
- a.) The total number of ingress/egress points to the site from existing and proposed thoroughfares that abut the site shall be limited to the number shown on the Plan. The exact locations may vary from those depicted based upon final design and location requirements as regulated by CDOT and NCDOT.
- b.) The Petitioner shall convey a 35' Right of Way from centerline along the property frontage of Kuykendall Road in fee simple fashion.
- c.) The Petitioner shall not be responsible for any signal improvements and/or modifications or signal pole relocations at the intersection of Kuykendall Road and Providence Road.
- d.) The Petitioner will be responsible for implementing a left-turn lane and associated tapers for the proposed Charlotte Retirement Residence. The petitioner shall provide the pavement necessary to accomodate the future cross section measuring 16.5' from the existing centerline of Kuvkendall Road. The Kuvkendall Road transportation improvements shall be completed and approved by CDOT/NCDOT before the building certificate of occupancy is issued. Final construction details will be discussed during the construction permitting process.
- e.) The proposed driveway connections to Providence Road and Kuykendall Road will require driveway permits to be submitted to CDOT and NCDOT for review and approval. The exact driveway locations and type/width of the driveways will be determined by CDOT during the driveway permit process. The locations of the driveways shown on the site plan are subject to change.
- f.) Any fence or wall constructed along or adjacent to any sidewalk or street right of way requires a certificate issued by CDOT.
- g.) A Right of Way Encroachment Agreement is required for the installation of any non standard item(s) (irrigation systems, decorative concrete pavement, brick pavers. etc.) within a proposed/existing City maintained street right of way by a private individual, group, business or homeowner's/business association. An encroachment agreement must be approved by CDOT prior to the construction/installation of the non-standard item(s). Contact CDOT for additional information concerning costs, submittal and liability insurance coverage requirements.
- h.) Adequate sight triangles must be reserved at the proposed street entrances. Two 35'x35' and two 10'x70' sight triangles are required for the entrances to meet requirements. All proposed trees, berms, walls, fences, and/or identification signs must not interfere with sight distance at the entrances.

4. ARCHITECTURAL STANDARDS

- · a.) Proposed zoning shall provide a 40' setback measured from the Right of Way of Kuykendall Road. A 40' side yard measured from the Right of Way of Providence Road and a 25' side and rear yard shall be provided. In the case that the maximum building height exceeds the maximum of 40', the side and rear yard shall be increased by 1' for every 1' of height greater than 40'. The maximum building height shall be 44'.
- b.) The intent of this design is to make the residence feel like home and not an institutional atmosphere or appearance. The facades of the facility are broken up by rooflines, patios and balconies as well as by the buildings overall asymmetrical shape. The wing ends and building center step down from three to two and then one story. There are no long building expanses or stark walls. The horizontal lines and vertical lines of the building shall be broken up with both plane and material changes. This arrangement provides for privacy and a gentle change of scale. This further emphasizes the residential look and feel verses an institutional appearance.
- c.) To further enliven the streetscape the buildings assortment of rooflines creates a residential feel similar to the nearby homes. The proportions of window and door openings, patios, balconies and railings are similar to what you may find in any standard single family home. The shaded porches and variety of eave lines along with the exterior siding and other accents are indicative of the shingle architecture style.
- d.) The exterior siding materials will include stucco and horizontal siding with brick, brick veneer, stone or simulated stone. No vinyl siding will be used, except for soffits and windows. Soffits and windows are proposed to be vinyl.

- e.) The roof will be architectural composition shingle.
- f.) The selected materials and colors are designed to accentuate the natural tones of the site and to compliment the surrounding landscape.
- g.) The same materials and similar design standards will apply to the garages and other accessory buildings on the site.
- h.) The loading and trash collection areas are well screened from both the view of the public and our residents.

5.) STREETSCAPE AND LANDSCAPING

- a.) As per Section 9.505 side and rear yard to be increased by 1 foot for each foot in building height in excess of 40
- b.) Proposed zoning shall provide a minimum 50 foot wide buffer in accordance with Section 12.302(9) of the Zoning
- c.) The Buffers listed above may be removed if the zoning of the abutting property becomes a similar or more intensive
- _____ d.) All landscaping and screening requirements shall meet the standards set forth by the City of Charlotte Zoning
- e.) The site is to be extensively landscaped with a goal of providing a park like atmosphere with beautiful outdoor amentias that benefit both our residents and our neighbors The site will feature a network of walking paths that provide a popular onsite exercise opportunity for our residents that is also available for the enjoyment of our neighbors. Usable outdoor spaces include extensive lawn and a partially covered patio off the craft/exercise room. Please note that no outdoor amenities or walking trails will be provided in tree save areas.

6. ENVIRONMENTAL FEATURES

- a.) The overall development shall provide 3.00 Acres of Tree Save Area, located generally in the vicinity depicted on the site plan.
- b.) Tree save area to be platted.
- c.) Tree save area to remain undisturbed.
- d.) The areas listed in the "Development Data" represents the Lot A portion of Tree Save Area to be provided.
- e.) Development on the site shall comply with the City of Charlotte Post Construction Controls Ordinance (PCCO).
- f.) The location, size, and type of storm water management systems depicted on the Rezoning Plan are subject to review and approval as part of the full development plan submittal and are not implicitly approved with this rezoning. Adjustments may be necessary in order to accommodate actual storm water treatment requirements and natural site discharge points.

7.) FIRE PROTECTION

a.) Fire protection shall meet the requirements set forth by the City of Charlotte Fire Department.

8.) LIGHTING


- a.) All freestanding lighting and all exterior lighting on buildings will be fully shielded and full cut-off type fixtures downwardly directed. No "wall-pak" type lighting will be used but attached decorative lighting fixtures such as sconces may be allowed. The maximum height of any freestanding lighting shall not exceed 16 feet.
- b.) Lighting on garages shall be wall mounted cutoff

9.) PARKING

a.) Parking will generally conform to the layout shown on the plan. Parking shall meet the requirement set forth by the City of Charlotte Zoning Ordinance.

10) SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT PLAN

a.) The Petitioner shall submit to the Mecklenburg County Solid Waste Department a Solid Waster Management Plan prior to initiating demolition and/or construction activities. The Solid Waste Management Plan will include. at a minimum, the procedures that will be used to recycle all clean wood, metal, and concrete generated during demolition and construction activities. Additionally, the Solid Waste Management Plan will specify that all land clearing and inert debris shall be taken to a properly permitted facility. The plan shall also include a requirement that a monthly reporting of all tonnage disposed and recycled will be made to the Mecklenburg County Solid Waste Program. The report shall include the identification and location of all facilities receiving disposed or recycled materials.

RESOLUTION CLOSING AN UNOPENED ALLEYWAY OFF OF NEWBERRY STREET IN THE CITY OF CHARLOTTE. MECKLENBURG COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 160A-299 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, the City Council has caused to be published a Resolution of Intent to close an unopened alleyway off of Newberry Street, which calls for a public hearing on the question; and,

WHEREAS, the petitioner has caused a copy of the Resolution of Intent to close an unopened alleyway off of Newberry Street to be sent by registered or certified mail to all owners of property adjoining the said street and prominently posted a notice of the closing and public hearing in at least 2 places along said street or alley, all as required by G.S. 160A-299; and

WHEREAS, the public hearing was held on the 9th day of June, 2014, and City Council determined that closing an unopened alleyway off of Newberry Street is not contrary to the public interest, and that no individual, firm or corporation owning property in the vicinity thereof will be deprived of reasonable means of ingress and egress to his or its property.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Charlotte, North Carolina at its regularly assembled meeting of June 9, 2014, that the Council hereby orders the closing of an unopened alleyway off of Newberry Street in the City of Charlotte Mecklenburg County, North Carolina as shown in the map marked "Exhibit A," and is more particularly described by metes and bounds in the document marked "Exhibit B," all of which are attached hereto and made a part hereof.

Charlotte Family Housing

- Charlotte Family Housing, formerly Workforce Initiative for Supportive Housing, provides supportive housing solutions for homeless working families with children.

Police Activities League

\$287,410

ORDINANCE NO AMENDING CHAPTER 13
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 13 OF THE CITY CODE, ENTITLED "LICENSES", TO CONFORM THE CITY PRIVILEGE LICENSE TAX TO RECENT LEGISLATIVE CHANGES AND TO PROVIDE AN ADDITIONAL 30 DAYS FOR TAXPAYERS TO PAY 2014-15 TAXES.
BE IT ORDAINED by the Charlotte City Council that:
Section 1. Section 13-27 of the City Code is rewritten to read as follows:
"Sec. 13-27. Who must pay tax.
Each person who conducts or engages in all trades, occupations, professions, businesses, and franchises physically located within the City."
Section 2. Subsection (a) of Sec. 13-30 of the City Code is amended as follows:
"(a) Annual. Unless otherwise specified, the license issued pursuant to this article is valid for the 12-month period beginning July 1 and ending June 30. The tax is due and payable no later than July 1July 31 of each year. However, if a person begins a business after July 1 of a year, the tax for that year shall be due and payable before the business is begun."
Section 3. Subsection (a) of Sec. 13-43 of the City Code is amended as follows:
"(a) All license taxes imposed by this article excluding beer, wine, taxicabs and the tax imposed in section 13-47, shall be due and payable in advance by July 2August 1, and if any person conducts any business without first paying such tax and obtaining a license by that date, there shall be assessed an additional tax equal to five percent of the amount prescribed for the license per month or fraction thereof until paid, not to exceed 25 percent of the amount so prescribed."
Section 4. This ordinance shall be effective upon adoption and shall only apply to the 2014-15 tax year.

- B. Facts Supporting the Amount of Bonds Proposed. The sums estimated for these bonds are adequate and not excessive for the proposed purposes. Estimates for the proposed construction and improvements have been carefully analyzed and determined by persons knowledgeable about the construction and improvements.
- C. Past Debt Management Procedures and Policies. The City's debt management procedures and policies are excellent and have been carried out in compliance with law. The City

employs a Chief Financial Officer to oversee compliance with applicable laws relating to debt management. The City Council requires annual audits of City finances. In connection with these audits, compliance with laws is reviewed. The City is not in default in any of its debt service obligations. The City Attorney reviews all debt-related documents for compliance with laws.

- D. Past Budgetary and Fiscal Management Policies. The City's budgetary and fiscal management policies have been carried out in compliance with laws. Annual budgets are closely reviewed by the City Council before final approval of budget ordinances. Budget amendments changing a function total or between functions are presented to the City Council at regular City Council meetings. The Chief Financial Officer presents financial information to the City Council which shows budget to actual comparisons annually and otherwise as the City Manager deems necessary or as a member of the City Council may request.
- E. Increase in Taxes; Retirement of Debt. The increase in taxes, if any, necessary to service the proposed debt will not be excessive. The schedule for issuance anticipates issuing all of the bonds in more than one series during fiscal years 2016 through 2018.

TRANSIT SERVICES ADVISORY COMMITTEE

(15 Members)

Membership - Council voted on September 10, 1990 to establish this committee. The first members were appointed on January 14, 1991, with staggered terms to begin on January 31, 1991. Future appointments will be made for three year terms. Council's appointments are (1) one major suburban employer served by Charlotte Transit, (2) one neighborhood organization leader, (3) one local service passenger, (4) one express service passenger, and (5) either a local or express service passenger. The Mayor's appointments are (1) one uptown employer served by Charlotte Transit, and (2) one disabled citizen who uses Charlotte Transit. There is no age requirement.

On August 23, 1999, City Council approved expanding the Transit Advisory Committee from seven members to 14 members as recommended by the Metropolitan Transit Commission (MTC) and to change the name to the Transit Service Advisory Committee.

The Metropolitan Transit Commission approved a new position on this Committee for a van pool rider on October 28, 2009.

<u>Responsibilities</u> - This committee will serve as a forum for citizen suggestions and complaints concerning fares, routes, and schedules. It will serve as an advocacy group for public transportation services and review staff recommendations on service provision transit policies. The committee will review and make recommendations on minimum performance standards for the system. The committee will explore emerging issues in public transit and work with staff on solutions.

RESOLUTION

PROVIDE A RESOLUTION GIVING PRELIMINARY APPROVAL TO ISSUANCE OF REVENUE BONDS TO FINANCE THE CONSTRUCTION OF A MIXED-INCOME HOUSING DEVELOPMENT (BOULEVARD HOMES PHASE III)

WHEREAS, the Housing Authority of the City of Charlotte, N.C. (the "Authority") is partnering with Laurel Street Residential, LLC, a North Carolina limited liability company, or another affiliated or related entity (the "Borrower"), in order to develop and build a mixed income housing development as part of Phase III of the Boulevard Homes HOPE VI revitalization plan; and

WHEREAS, as part of Phase III, the Borrower and the Authority intend to develop and build a 150 unit mixed income development, which will include ninety (90) units with income restricted at 60% or less of area median income supported by the 4% noncompetitive Low Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) program (of which fifty-two (52) units will be public housing and fifteen (15) units will be community based rental assistance (CBRA) units) and the remaining units will be market rate units (collectively, the "Development"); and

WHEREAS, as part of the financing plan for the Development, the Borrower has requested that the Authority assist by issuing its multifamily housing revenue bonds to provide a portion of the costs of acquiring and constructing the Development, which will also make the Borrower and the Development eligible for the 4% tax credits under the LIHTC program; and

WHEREAS, the Borrower has described to the Authority the benefits of the Development to the City of Charlotte and the State of North Carolina and has requested the Authority to agree to issue its revenue bonds in such amounts as may be necessary to finance the development; and

WHEREAS, the Authority is of the opinion that the Development is a facility which can be financed under the Act and that the financing of the same will be in furtherance of the purposes of the Act;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Commissioners of the Housing Authority of the City of Charlotte:

1. It is hereby found and determined that the Development will involve the construction of a multifamily housing development to serve persons of low and moderate income, and that therefore, pursuant to the terms and subject to the conditions hereinafter stated and the Act, the Authority agrees to assist the Borrower in every reasonable way to issue bonds to finance the construction of the Development, and, in particular, to undertake the issuance of the Authority's revenue bonds (the "Bonds") in one or more series in an aggregate amount now estimated not to exceed Ten Million Dollars (\$10,000,000) to provide all or part of the cost of the Development.

- 2. The Authority intends that the adoption of this resolution be considered as "official action" toward the issuance of the Bonds within the meaning of the regulations issued by the Internal Revenue Service pursuant to Section 141 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code").
- 3. The Bonds shall be issued in such series and amounts and upon such terms and conditions as are mutually agreed upon among the Authority and the Borrower. The Authority and the Borrower shall enter into a "financing agreement" pursuant to the Act for a term and upon payments sufficient to pay the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on the Bonds and to pay all of the expenses of the Authority in connection with the Bonds and the Development. The Bonds will be issued pursuant to an indenture or security agreement between the Authority and a trustee (the "Trustee") or the bondholder which will set forth the form and terms of the Bonds and will assign to the Trustee for the benefit of the holders of the Bonds, or directly to the bondholder, the Authority's rights to payments under the financing agreement. The Bonds shall not be deemed to constitute a debt or a pledge of the faith and credit of the State of North Carolina or any political subdivision or agency thereof, including the Authority and the City of Charlotte, but shall be payable solely from the revenues and other funds provided under the proposed agreements with the Borrower.
- 4. The Authority will proceed, upon the prior advice, consent and approval of the Borrower, bond counsel and the Authority's counsel, to obtain approvals in connection with the issuance and sale of the Bonds, including, without limitation, from the City of Charlotte and the North Carolina Local Government Commission.
- 5. It having been represented to the Authority that it is desirable to proceed with the acquisition and construction of the development, the Authority agrees that the Borrower may proceed with plans for such construction, enter into contracts for the same, and take such other steps as it may deem appropriate in connection therewith, provided that nothing herein shall be deemed to authorize the Borrower to obligate the Authority without its written consent in each instance to the payment of any monies or the performance of any act in connection with the Development and no such consent shall be implied from the Authority's adoption of this resolution. The Authority agrees that the Borrower may be reimbursed from the proceeds of the Bonds for all qualifying costs so incurred by it as permitted by Internal Revenue Service Regulations Section 1.150-2.
- 6. All obligations hereunder of the Authority are subject to the further agreement of the Authority and the Borrower, to satisfactory underwriting of the Development, and mutual agreement to the terms for the Bonds, including the execution of a financing agreement, indenture, or security agreement and other documents and agreements necessary or desirable for the issuance, sale and delivery of the Bonds. The Authority has not authorized and does not authorize the expenditure of any funds or monies of the Authority from any source other than the issuance of the Bonds. All costs and expenses in connection with the financing and the construction of the Development and the issuance of the Bonds, including the reasonable fees and expenses of the Authority's counsel, bond counsel, and the agent or underwriter for the sale of the Bonds, shall be paid from the proceeds of the Bonds or by the Borrower, but if for

any reason the Bonds are not issued, all such expenses shall be paid by the Borrower and the Authority shall have no responsibility therefore. It is understood and agreed by the Authority and the Borrower that nothing contained in this resolution shall be construed or interpreted to create any personal liability of the officers or commissioners from time to time of the Authority.

- 7. The officers of the Authority are hereby authorized and directed to take all actions in furtherance of the issuance of the Bonds, including calling for a public hearing with respect to the financing of the development through the issuance of the Bonds.
- 8. Hunton & Williams LLP, Raleigh, North Carolina, shall act as bond counsel for the Bonds.
 - 9. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its passage.

RESOLUTION PROVIDING APPROVAL OF A MULTIFAMILY HOUSING FACILITY KNOWN AS BOULEVARD PHASE III APARTMENTS IN THE CITY OF CHARLOTTE, NORTH CAROLINA AND THE FINANCING THEREOF WITH MULTIFAMILY HOUSING REVENUE BONDS IN AN AGGREGATE AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$10,000,000

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Charlotte (the "City") met in Charlotte, North Carolina at 7:00 p.m. on the 9th day of June, 2014; and

WHEREAS, the Housing Authority of the City of Charlotte, NC (the "Issuer") has tentatively agreed to issue its multifamily housing revenue bonds in an amount not to exceed \$10,000,000 (the "Bonds"), for the purpose of financing the acquisition and construction by Boulevard Phase III, LLC, a North Carolina limited company (the "Borrower"), or an affiliate or subsidiary thereof, of a mixed income multifamily residential rental facility to be known as The Residences at Renaissance Apartments (the "Development"); and

WHEREAS, the Development will consist of approximately 150 units, located on the former Boulevard Homes site on an approximately 18.46 acre site at 3610 Nobles Avenue in the City of Charlotte, Mecklenburg County, North Carolina; and

WHEREAS, Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), requires that any bonds issued by the Issuer for the Development may only be issued after approval of the plan of financing by the City following a public hearing with respect to such plan; and

WHEREAS, on May 20, 2014, the Issuer held a public hearing with respect to the issuance of the Bonds to finance, in part, the Development (as evidenced by the Certificate and Summary of Public Hearing attached hereto) and has requested the City to approve the issuance of the Bonds as required by the Code; and

WHEREAS, the City has determined that approval of the issuance of the Bonds is solely to satisfy the requirement of Section 147(f) of the Code and shall in no event constitute an endorsement of the Bonds or the Development or the creditworthiness of the Borrower, nor shall such approval in any event be construed to obligate the City of Charlotte, North Carolina for the payment of the principal of or premium or interest on the Bonds or for the performance of any pledge, mortgage or obligation or agreement of any kind whatsoever which may be undertaken by the Issuer, or to constitute the Bonds or any of the agreements or obligations of the Issuer an indebtedness of the City of Charlotte, North Carolina, within the meaning of any constitutional or statutory provision whatsoever;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CHARLOTTE:

1. The proposed mixed income housing development consisting of the acquisition, and construction of the Development described above in the City of Charlotte, Mecklenburg County, North Carolina by the Borrower and the issuance of the Authority's multifamily housing revenue bonds therefor in an amount not to exceed \$10,000,000 are hereby approved for purposes of Section 147(f) of the Code. The Mayor is hereby authorized to execute such

approval certificates as may be required to evidence the City's approval of the issuance of the Bonds for purposes of Section 147(f) of the Code.
2. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its passage.

AGREEMENT For 911 FUND ALLOCATIONS To SECONDARY PSAP

THIS AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made effective the 1st day of July 2014 by and between the CITY OF CHARLOTTE, a municipal corporation ("City") specifically, the CHARLOTTE-MECKLENBURG POLICE DEPARTMENT ("CMPD"), a unit of local government operating a Primary Public Safety Answering Point ("PSAP") and the NORTH CAROLINA 911 BOARD ("911 Board"), an agency of the State of North Carolina. The CMPD and 911 Board (the "Parties") hereby agree as follows:

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the 911 Board was created by SL 2007-383 (N.C. Gen. Stat.§62A-40 et seq.) to collect and administer the 911 Fund; and

WHEREAS, the 911 Board adopted a policy allowing allocation of distributions from the 911 Fund for eligible expenditures of a Secondary PSAP that is able to receive the voice and data of an Enhanced 911 call transferred from a Primary PSAP and to complete the call taking process dispatching law, medical, fire or other responder; and

WHEREAS, the CMPD presently transfers 911 calls to the Charlotte Mecklenburg Fire Department and the Mecklenburg Medical Services Agency and they serve as Secondary PSAP(S), which relieves the CMPD from completing the call taking process and dispatching such 911 calls; and

WHEREAS, the CMPD and the aforementioned Secondary PSAP(S) operate within the same 911 System and the CMPD desires distributions from the 911 Fund to further distribute for the benefit of the Secondary PSAP(S); and

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to contract in accordance with the Secondary PSAP funding policies, rules, and regulations of the 911 Board;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties enter into this Agreement to implement the 911 Board's Secondary PSAP Funding Policy attached hereto as Exhibit A, the Parties hereto do mutually agree to the following terms and conditions:

- 1. DEFINITIONS. The following terms shall have the following meanings for purposes of this Contract (including all Exhibits). Definitions not defined below which are set forth in N.C. Gen. Stat. §62A-40 *et seq.* are incorporated herein.
 - 1.1. "Back-up PSAP": means a facility equipped to operate as part of the 911 System and all other features of its associated Primary PSAP. A Backup PSAP receives 911 calls only when they are transferred from the Primary

- PSAP or on an alternate routing basis when calls cannot be completed to the Primary PSAP.
- 1.2. "Interoperable": Capability of the telephone systems of the Primary and Secondary PSAPs to ensure complete transfer of a 911 call.
- 1.3. "Secondary PSAP Funding Policy": means Exhibit A to this Agreement and as the Policy may be amended.
- 1.4. "Secondary PSAP": is able to receive the voice and data of an Enhanced 911 call transferred from a Primary PSAP and complete the call taking process dispatching law, medical, fire or other responder. Receiving the voice and data of an Enhanced 911 call includes all identification and location data generated by the Subscriber.
- 1.5. "Executive Director": the Executive Director of the 911 Board.
- 1.6. "Allocated Funds": the amount authorized by the 911 Board for distribution to the CMPD for further allocation to a Secondary PSAP determined annually based on a "per 911 call basis" as measured by the Electronic Call Analysis Tracking System. These Allocated Funds shall not diminish the monthly base amount distribution to the CMPD, nor modify the CMPD's carry-forward pursuant to N.C.G.S. §62A-46(b1).
- 1.7. "State Funds": Any funds appropriated by the N.C. General Assembly or collected by the State of North Carolina. The 911 Funds are State Funds. The Parties recognizes that the expenditure of money deposited in the State treasury, including the 911 Fund, is subject to acts of appropriation by the General Assembly and actions of the Budget Director.
- 1.8. "Unit of Local Government": As defined in N.C. Gen. Stat. §160A-460, means a county, city, consolidated city-county, local board of education, sanitary district, facility authority created under Article 20 of Chapter 160A of the General Statutes, special district created under Article 43 of Chapter 105 of the General Statutes, or other local political subdivision, authority, or agency of local government.

2. SECONDARY PSAP.

2.1. The Secondary PSAP(S) to receive the Allocated Funds are operated by the Charlotte Mecklenburg Fire Department and the Mecklenburg Emergency Medical Services Agency and each receive 911 calls transferred from CMPD, the Primary PSAP, to complete the call taking and dispatching process. The Parties agree and acknowledge that the conditions set forth in Exhibit A, the 911 Board's Secondary PSAP Funding Policy, must be satisfied.

- 2.2. Allocated Funds shall be determined by the 911 Board and utilize call data from the CMPD. Allocated Funds shall not be available for a Back-up PSAP.
- 2.3. This Agreement and the Agreements with the Secondary PSAP(S) [Exhibit B] will be provided to the Executive Director prior to disbursement of the Allocated Funds from the 911 Fund.
- 2.4. 911 System equipment may be procured by the CMPD and placed within either the CMPD or the a Secondary PSAP by consent of the parties; provided that such equipment used to complete the call taking and dispatch processes shall be interoperable if purchased by the Primary PSAP; e.g. Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD).
- 2.5. To the greatest extent practicable, expenditures of the Allocated Funds shall be made to ensure greater interoperability in call taking, processing and dispatching appropriate responders.
- 2.6. The CMPD will collect and compile documents required to be provided by the Secondary PSAP(S) as directed by the 911 Board for the purpose of verifying the requirements of the Secondary PSAP Funding Policy.
- 2.7. The CMPD shall assist the 911 Board in any audits of the Allocated Funds by supplying required document(s) to satisfy the requests of an auditor.

3. CHANGES IN FUND DISTRIBUTIONS.

- 3.1. The Parties acknowledge that if changes are requested with respect to the Allocated Fund distributions or allocations, such changes must be authorized in writing by the 911 Board. The Parties understand the 911 Board will not approve any changes that exceed its authority under N.C. Gen. Stat. §62A-40 *et seq.*, or subsequent modification thereof.
- 3.2. A Secondary PSAP may carry forward Allocated Funds for eligible expenditures for capital outlay, capital improvements, or equipment replacement. Amounts carried forward to the next fiscal year from Allocated Funds made by the 911 Board may not be used to lower the Allocated Funds unless the amount is greater than twenty percent (20%) of the average yearly amount distributed to the Secondary PSAP in the prior two years. The 911 Board may allow a Secondary PSAP to carry forward a greater amount without changing the Secondary PSAP's Allocated Funds.
- 3.3. Administrative expenses or costs of a Primary or Secondary PSAP are not eligible expenses for 911 Fund distributions.

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- 3.4. Each Party shall immediately notify the other of any change in conditions or applicable law, or any other event, which may significantly affect its ability to perform its obligations under this Agreement.
- 3.5. The Parties agree that the 911 Board may assign this Agreement to its successor or continue the Agreement by amending the term if legislation is enacted that does, or may, affect the terms of this Agreement.
- 3.6. A request for change in the allocation of funds by a Secondary PSAP must be submitted to the 911 Board Executive Director stating the basis for the request. The Request must be submitted at the same time that CMPD as a Primary PSAP would submit its requests for additional funds. The CMPD shall submit a revised budget received from the Secondary PSAP and forward and any other documentation or information requested by the Executive Director indicating the planned use of such additional funds.
- 4. TERM. The term of this Agreement shall commence on July 1, 2014 (the "Effective Date") and automatically renew for an additional one (1) year term, unless otherwise terminated or amended as provided herein. Allocated Funds provided by the 911 Board may not be utilized for expenses incurred by the Parties prior to the Effective Date or subsequent to the termination of this Agreement.
- 5. DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDS. Allocated Funds will be delivered to the CMPD together with the monthly base amount distributed to the CMPD as the Primary PSAP.
 - 5.1. Allocated Funds shall be distributed only for expenses that are eligible under N.C. Gen. Stat. §62A-40 *et seq.* and the policies of the 911 Board.
 - 5.2. Administrative costs are not allowable expenses.
 - 5.3 The CMPD and Secondary PSAP will maintain full, accurate, and verifiable accounting records to support the preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting practices applicable to N.C. local governments as approved by, or consistent with, standards of the Local Government Commission.
 - 5.4. In the event the CMPD or a Secondary PSAP breaches any of the terms contained in this Agreement including the agreements between the CMPD and a Secondary PSAP (Exhibit B) to this Agreement, or the 911 Board determines that a Secondary PSAP has made material misrepresentations in any document received by the 911 Board; the CMPD shall return any un-distributed Allocated Funds held by the CMPD. The CMPD's obligations that are created by this subsection to return Allocated Funds and to refund sums, apply only to Allocated Funds held by the CMPD. Allocated Funds are "held" by the CMPD only to the extent they are in the actual, not constructive, possession of the CMPD.

5.5 The CMPD is required to attend workshops or other instructional sessions relating to administration of the Grant or use of the 911 Funds provided by the 911 Board during the term of this Agreement.

6. INDEPENDENT STATUS OF PARTIES.

- 6.1. It is agreed between the Parties that neither this Agreement nor any provisions hereof shall be deemed to create a partnership or joint venture between or among the CMPD, the 911 Board, or a Secondary PSAP.
- 6.2. The Parties acknowledge that they are each independent entities. Neither Party shall represent itself as an agent of the other Party. Nor shall this Agreement be construed so as to make either party an agent of the other Party. Neither Party shall have the ability to bind the other Party to any agreement for payment of goods or services, nor shall it represent to any person or entity that it has such ability.

7. RECORDS, RECORDS RETENTION.

- 7.1. The CMPD shall maintain full, accurate and verifiable financial records, supporting documents, and all other pertinent data that are provided to the CMPD by a Secondary PSAP consistent with the 911 Board's funding model and policies.
- 7.2. The CMPD shall retain all financial records, supporting documents, and all other pertinent records provided by a Secondary PSAP related to this Agreement for five (5) years from the termination of this Agreement. In the event such records are audited, all such records shall be retained beyond the five-year period until any and all audit findings have been resolved.
- 7.3. Pursuant to N.C. Gen. Stat. §143C-6-23, and §147-64.7, the CMPD agrees to make available to the State Auditor or designated representatives of the foregoing, requested records provided by a Secondary PSAP, and agrees to allow the 911 Board or its representative to audit, examine and copy any and all requested data, documents, proceedings, records and notes of activity provided to the CMPD by a Secondary PSAP. Access to these records shall be allowed upon request at any time during normal business hours and as often as the 911 Board or its representative may deem necessary.
- 7.4. The CMPD acknowledges and agrees that it will be subject to the audit and reporting requirements prescribed by N.C. Gen. Stat. § 143C-6-23 et seq., and The Local Government and Fiscal Control Act-Annual Independent Audit, Rules, N.C. Gen. Stat. §62A-40 et seq. and the policies, procedures and rules of the 911 Board; as applicable.

- 8. TERMINATION; AVAILABILITY OF FUNDS.
 - 8.1. If the CMPD fails for any reason to fulfill in a timely and proper manner its obligations under this Agreement, the 911 Board shall thereupon have the right to terminate this Agreement by giving written notice to the CMPD of such termination and by specifying the effective date of termination. In such event, the 911 Board shall have no responsibility to make additional payments under this Agreement after the Termination Date. The CMPD shall return all "held" Allocated Funds to the 911 Board without the demand therefor. The CMPD shall not be relieved of liability to the 911 Board for damages sustained by the 911 Board by virtue of breach related to Allocated Funds contained in this Agreement. The 911 Board may withhold Allocated Funds payment to the CMPD for the purpose of set-off until such time as the exact amount of damages due the 911 Board from such breach can be determined.
 - 8.2. The 911 Board may terminate this Agreement immediately upon notice to the CMPD at any time if sufficient funds are not available to satisfy the Allocated Funds, or if a Secondary PSAP fails to meet the policies, procedures or rules of the 911 Board.
 - 8.3. Either party may terminate this Agreement upon sixty (60) days' notice, or by mutual consent as may be agreed. Notice may be given by either party to the other at the addresses and to the attention of the Party's representative specified below.
 - 8.4. Termination of this Agreement by the CMPD shall not prohibit the 911 Board from seeking remedy for additional costs consequential to the termination, which are incurred by the 911 Board relating to Allocated Funds.
 - 8.5. The Parties recognizes that the expenditure of money deposited in the State treasury, including the 911 Fund, is subject to acts of appropriation by the General Assembly and actions of the Budget Director.
- 9. LIABILITIES AND LOSS. Neither Party assumes liability, nor shall it have any liability under this Agreement, with respect to accidents, bodily injury, illness, or any other related damages, claims, or losses arising out of any activities undertaken by the 911 Board, the CMPD, a Secondary PSAP, or any contractors.
- 10. REMEDIES. In the event of the CMPD's non-compliance with any provision in this Agreement or a Secondary PSAP's failure to adhere to the policies, rules and statutes of the 911 Board, the 911 Board may take any actions authorized by the policies, rules and statutes of the 911 Board or by this Agreement. These remedies include, but are not limited to, reducing or suspending Allocated Funds or terminating such, including the withdrawal of all CMPD "held" Allocated Funds

- described in this Agreement. However, no termination of this Agreement removes the reporting and records retention requirements of this Agreement.
- 11. CMPD'S REPRESENTATION AND WARRANTIES. The CMPD hereby represents and warrants that:
 - 11.1. The CMPD is duly organized and validly existing as a unit of local government under the laws of the State of North Carolina.
 - 11.2. This Agreement constitutes a binding obligation of the City through the CMPD, and is enforceable in accordance with its terms. The execution and delivery of this Agreement has been duly authorized by all necessary action on the part of the City, and does not violate any applicable organizational documents of the CMPD or any agreement or undertaking to which it is a party or by which it is bound.
 - 11.3. There is no action, suit, proceeding, or investigation at law or in equity or before any court, public board or body pending, or to the CMPD's knowledge, threatened against or affecting it, that could or might adversely affect any of the transactions contemplated by this Agreement or the validity or enforceability of this Agreement or the CMPD's ability to discharge its obligations under this Agreement.
 - 11.4. All consents or approvals necessary from any governmental authority as a condition to the execution and delivery of this Agreement have been obtained by the CMPD.
 - 11.5. The parties will notify the Executive Director of any significant problems relating to the administrative or financial aspects associated with the Allocated Funds, such as misappropriation of funds; use of 911 Funds for non-eligible expenses; placement or retaining 911 funds in any account other than the Emergency System Telephone Fund.
- 12. EXCUSABLE DELAY (FORCE MAJEURE). Neither Party shall be liable for any failure or delay in performing any of its obligations under this Agreement that is due to causes beyond its reasonable control, such as, but not limited to, acts of God, earthquakes and other natural catastrophes, governmental acts, shortages of supplies, riots, war, fire, epidemics, delays in common carriers, labor strikes or other difficulties or circumstances beyond its reasonable control. The CMPD shall notify the 911 Board promptly of any factor, occurrence or event that comes to its attention that may affect or delay the CMPD's ability to perform any of its other obligations hereunder. The obligations and rights of the excused party shall be extended on a day to day basis for the time period equal to the period of the excusable delay.
- 13. DISPUTE RESOLUTION. The Parties agree that it is in their mutual interest to resolve disputes informally. The Parties shall negotiate in good faith and use all reasonable efforts to resolve such dispute(s). During the time the Parties are

attempting to resolve any dispute, each shall proceed diligently to perform their respective duties and responsibilities under this Agreement. If a dispute cannot be resolved between the Parties within thirty (30) days after delivery of notice, either Party may elect to exercise any other remedies available under this Agreement, or at law; or invite the other party to submit the matter to mediation. Provided, however, that this term shall not constitute an agreement by either Party to mediate or arbitrate any dispute; and that any agreement to mediate may be revoked or terminated without penalty therefore if so advised by either Party's legal counsel.

- 14. CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION. The Parties acknowledge and agree that each is subject to the N.C. Public Records Act, which is set forth in N.C. General Statutes 132-1, et seq. Proprietary information may be subject to N.C. Gen. Stat. §62A-52. The CMPD shall ensure that any third party is encouraged to review the applicable laws prior to submitting any information or documentation believed to be proprietary, and that any proprietary information is properly identified at the time of receipt.
 - 14.1. The Parties shall maintain the confidentiality of certain types of information described in N.C. Gen. Stat. §132-1, et seq. and N.C. Gen. Stat. §62A-52. Such information may include trade secrets defined by N.C. Gen. Stat. §66-152 and other information exempted from disclosures pursuant to the Public Records Act pursuant to N.C. Gen. Stat. §132-1.2.
 - 14.2. The 911 Board may serve as custodian of confidential information and not as an arbiter of claims against an assertion of confidentiality. If an action is brought pursuant to N.C. Gen. Stat. §132-9 to compel disclosure information marked confidential, the disclosing Party agrees that it will provide prompt notice of such action, intervene in the action through its counsel and participate in defending the Parties, including any public official(s) or public employee(s). Neither Party shall have liability to the other Party or any third party with respect to the disclosure of confidential information ordered by a court of competent jurisdiction pursuant to N.C. Gen. Stat. §132-9 or other applicable law; nor by disclosure of unmarked information or information that is publicly known.
- 15. NOTICE. All notices required or permitted to be delivered hereunder and all communications in respect hereof shall be in writing and shall be deemed given when personally delivered by one or more of the following: when deposited in the United States mails, first class, postage prepaid and properly addressed, by facsimile, or by e-mail, as follows:

16. CONSTRUCTION. This Agreement shall be construed and governed by the laws of the State of North Carolina. The place of this Agreement, its situs and forum, shall be Mecklenburg County, North Carolina, where all matters, whether sounding in contract or in tort, relating to its validity, construction, interpretation and enforcement shall be determined. The Parties agree and submit, solely for matters relating to this Contract, to the jurisdiction of the courts of the State of North Carolina, and stipulate that Mecklenburg County shall be the proper venue for all matters.

17. GENERAL PROVISIONS AND CONDITIONS.

- 17.1 The 911 Board may request from CMPD certain information that will assist the 911 Board with evaluation of the short and long-range impact of its Secondary PSAP program. The CMPD recognizes that such requests may occur after termination of this Agreement and agrees, to the extent possible, to provide to the 911 Board such information as requested.
- 17.2 Nondiscrimination. The Parties agree not to discriminate by reason of age, race, religion, color, sex, national origin, or handicap related to the activities of this Agreement.
- 17.3 Conflict of Interest. The CMPD certifies that to the best of its knowledge no employee or officer of the CMPD has any pecuniary interest in the business of the 911 Board or Allocated Funds, and that no person

- associated with the CMPD has any interest that would conflict in any manner with the performance of this Agreement.
- 17.4 Compliance with Laws. The Parties shall at all times observe and comply with all laws, ordinances, and regulation of the state, federal and local governments which may affect the performance of the Agreement.
- 17.5 Non-Assignability. The CMPD shall not assign any interest in the Agreement and shall not transfer any interest in the same without prior written consent of the 911 Board.
- 17.6 Future Cooperation. The 911 Board and the CMPD agree to cooperate fully with one another, to execute any and all supplementary documents and/or agreements that may be necessary or helpful to give full force and effect to the terms of this Agreement and to the Parties' intentions in entering this Agreement.
- 18. Entire Agreement. This Agreement supersedes all and expresses the entire understanding of the Parties with respect to the transactions contemplated herein, and shall not be amended, modified or altered except pursuant to a writing signed by both Parties.

November 13, 2013 Secondary PSAP Funding Recommendation

- Recommendation: The Secondary PSAP Funding Committee recommends adoption
 of the following individual recommendations as a formal policy of the 911 Board.
- A. 911 Fund disbursements to the primary PSAPs shall not be affected by disbursements for the secondary PSAPs made pursuant to agreements made pursuant to this policy.
- B. 911 Fund disbursements for a secondary PSAP may be permitted through a primary PSAP when all of the conditions set forth below are met, and the funding allocations for the benefit of a secondary PSAP are approved by the 911 Board.
- The primary and secondary PSAPs are part of the same 911 System conforming to G.S. 624-40 et seq.
- 2) An interlocal agreement consistent with this policy exists between the governing bodies of the primary PSAP and the secondary PSAP defining and assigning responsibilities of answering and responding to 911 calls.
- 3) Any portion of 911 Fund disbursements allocated to a secondary PSAP will be provided by the primary PSAP to the secondary PSAP, and limited to eligible 911 expenses as shown in the Board's eligible expenditures list.
- 4) A primary PSAP disbursing 911 Funds to a secondary PSAP shall report all 911 funds distributed to, and 911 expenditures incurred by, a secondary PSAP annually. This report shall not be combined with the primary PSAP's report of expenditures to the North Carolina 911 Board. The primary PSAP shall obtain and provide additional information relating to a secondary PSAP's 911 operations or expenses upon the Board's request.
- 5) Actual costs per call will be determined by the total annual approved costs of the primary PSAP for the most recent funding year divided by the total number of 911 calls received by the primary PSAP for the same year.
- 6) Funding for a secondary PSAP will be based on a per 911 call basis as measured by the Electronic Call Analysis Tracking System (ECaTS) as provided by the North Carolina 911 Board.
- 7) That any additional funding requested by a secondary PSAP shall follow the procedure established by the Board as the "Annual Funding Reconsideration Request" and must be processed by the primary PSAP associated with secondary PSAP.

- 8) The interlocal agreement shall include provisions terminating or suspending disbursements of 911 Funds; such provisions may include:
- Termination of the disbursement agreement made by the Board and the primary PSAP,
- Failure to meet the Board policy for disbursements to secondary PSAPs,
- Changes in statutory authority disallowing such disbursements of the 911 Fund,
- Cessation of the primary or secondary PSAP's operations, and

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- Mutual agreement of the parties, or by other action of a governing body which prevents further participation.
- C. The 911 Board establishes priorities for 911 Fund disbursements to ensure that adequate funds are available to meet the Board's statutory disbursement obligations. PSAP disbursement priorities in order of importance are 1) primary PSAPs, 2) secondary PSAPs and 3) PSAP grants.
- D. The Board and a primary PSAP enter into an agreement to disburse 911 Funds to the primary for the benefit of, and further delivery to, a secondary PSAP. The agreement shall identify allocations for a secondary PSAP or the method of determining such allocations, conditions for suspension and termination of funding for secondary PSAPs, and such other terms or conditions as may be necessary or proper pursuant to N.C.G.S. 62A and the Board's policies, standards and rules.
- This policy will be effective July 1, 2014.

Exhibit B Secondary PSAP Agreements

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN CITY OF CHARLOTTE AND

MECKLENBURG EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES AGENCY

THIS INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made effective the 1st day of July 2014 by and between the CITY OF CHARLOTTE) ("City"), a municipal corporation organized under the laws of the State of North Carolina, specifically, the CHARLOTTE-MECKLENBURG POLICE DEPARTMENT ("CMPD"), and the MECKLENBURG EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES AGENCY ("AGENCY"), a North Carolina joint governmental agency.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the 911 Board was created by SL 2007-383 (N.C. Gen. Stat.§62A-40 et seq.) to collect and administer the 911 Fund; and

WHEREAS, the 911 Board adopted a policy allowing allocation of distributions from the 911 Fund for eligible expenditures of a Secondary Public Safety Answering Point ("Secondary PSAP") that is able to receive the voice and data of an Enhanced 911 call transferred from a Primary PSAP and to complete the call taking process dispatching law, medical, fire or other responder; and

WHEREAS, the CMPD as a Primary PSAP presently transfers 911 ambulance calls to the AGENCY, a Secondary PSAP, which relieves the CMPD from completing the call taking process and dispatching such 911 calls; and

WHEREAS, the CMPD and the AGENCY operate within the same 911 System and the CMPD desire distributions from the 911 Fund to further distribute for the benefit of the AGENCY; and

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to contract in accordance with the Secondary PSAP funding policies, rules, and regulations of the 911 Board;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the undersigned Parties agree as follows:

- 1. DEFINITIONS. The following terms shall have the following meanings for purposes of this Contract (including all Exhibits). Definitions not defined below which are set forth in N.C. Gen. Stat. §62A-40 *et seq.* are incorporated herein.
 - 1.1. "Back-up PSAP": means a facility equipped to operate as part of the 911 System and all other features of its associated Primary PSAP. A Backup PSAP receives 911 calls only when they are transferred from the Primary

- PSAP or on an alternate routing basis when calls cannot be completed to the Primary PSAP.
- 1.2. "Interoperable": Capability of the telephone systems of the Primary and Secondary PSAPs to ensure complete transfer of a 911 call.
- 1.3. "Secondary PSAP Funding Policy": means Exhibit A to this Agreement and as the Policy may be amended.
- 1.4. "Secondary PSAP": is able to receive the voice and data of an Enhanced 911 call transferred from a Primary PSAP and complete the call taking process dispatching law, medical, fire or other responder. Receiving the voice and data of an Enhanced 911 call includes all identification and location data generated by the Subscriber.
- 1.5. "Executive Director": the Executive Director of the 911 Board.
- 1.6. "Allocated Funds": the amount authorized by the 911 Board for distribution to the CMPD for further allocation to the AGENCY determined annually based on a "per 911 call basis" as measured by the Electronic Call Analysis Tracking System. These Allocated Funds shall not diminish the monthly base amount distribution to the CMPD, nor modify the CMPD's carry-forward pursuant to N.C.G.S. §62A-46(b1).
- 1.7. "State Funds": Any funds appropriated by the N.C. General Assembly or collected by the State of North Carolina. The 911 Funds are State Funds. The Parties recognizes that the expenditure of money deposited in the State treasury, including the 911 Fund, is subject to acts of appropriation by the General Assembly and actions of the Budget Director.
- 1.8. "Unit of Local Government": As defined in N.C. Gen. Stat. §160A-460, means a county, city, consolidated city-county, local board of education, sanitary district, facility authority created under Article 20 of Chapter 160A of the General Statutes, special district created under Article 43 of Chapter 105 of the General Statutes, or other local political subdivision, authority, or agency of local government.

SECONDARY PSAP.

2.1. The AGENCY to receive the Allocated Funds is operated by Mecklenburg Emergency Medical Services Agency (MEDIC) and receives 911ambulance calls transferred from CMPD, the Primary PSAP, to complete the call taking and dispatching process. The Parties agree and acknowledge that the conditions set forth in Exhibit A, the 911 Board's Secondary PSAP Funding Policy, must be satisfied.

- 2.2. Allocated Funds shall be determined by the 911 Board and utilize call data from the CMPD. Allocated Funds shall not be available for Back-up PSAPs.
- 2.3. This Agreement will be provided to the Executive Director prior to disbursement of the Allocated Funds from the 911 Fund.
- 2.4. 911 System equipment may be procured by the CMPD and placed within either the CMPD or the AGENCY by consent of the parties; provided that such equipment used to complete the call taking and dispatch processes shall be interoperable if purchased by the Primary PSAP; e.g. Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD).
- 2.5. To the greatest extent practicable, expenditures of the Allocated Funds shall be made to ensure greater interoperability in call taking, processing and dispatching appropriate responders.
- 2.6. The CMPD will collect and compile documents required to be provided by the AGENCY as directed by the 911 Board for the purpose of verifying the requirements of the Secondary PSAP Funding Policy.
- 2.7. The AGENCY shall assist the CMPD in any audits of the 911 Fund by supplying required document(s) to satisfy the requests of an auditor.

CHANGES IN FUND DISTRIBUTIONS.

- 3.1. The Parties acknowledge that if changes are requested with respect to 911 Fund distributions or allocations, such changes must be authorized in writing by the 911 Board. The Parties understand the 911 Board will not approve any changes that exceed its authority under N.C. Gen. Stat. §62A-40 et seq., or subsequent modification thereof.
- 3.2. The AGENCY may carry forward Allocated Funds for eligible expenditures for capital outlay, capital improvements, or equipment replacement. Amounts carried forward to the next fiscal year from Allocated Funds made by the 911 Board may not be used to lower the Allocated Funds unless the amount is greater than twenty percent (20%) of the average yearly amount distributed to the AGENCY in the prior two years. The 911 Board may allow the AGENCY to carry forward a greater amount without changing the AGENCY'S Allocated Funds.
- 3.3. Administrative expenses or costs of the Parties are not eligible expenses for 911 Fund distributions.
- 3.4. Each Party shall immediately notify the other of any change in conditions or applicable law, or any other event, which may significantly affect its ability to perform its obligations under this Agreement.

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- 3.5. The Parties agree that the CMPD, as a Primary PSAP, may assign this Agreement to its successor or continue the Agreement by amending the term if restructuring of City/County government and/or legislation is enacted that does, or may, affect the term of this Agreement.
- 3.6. A request for change in the allocation of funds by the AGENCY must be submitted to the CMPD in writing to forward to the Executive Director. The Request must comply with the 911 Board's policies and state the basis for the request. The Request must be submitted at the same time that CMPD as a Primary PSAP would submit its requests for additional funds. The AGENCY shall submit a revised budget and any other documentation or information requested by the Executive Director to the CMPD indicating the planned use of such additional funds.
- 4. TERM. The term of this Agreement shall commence on July 1, 2014 (the "Effective Date") and automatically renew for an additional one (1) year term, unless otherwise terminated or amended as provided herein. Allocated Funds provided by the 911 Board may not be utilized for expenses incurred by the Parties prior to the Effective Date or subsequent to the termination of this Agreement.
- 5. DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDS. Allocated Funds will be delivered to the CMPD together with the monthly base amount distributed to the CMPD.
 - 5.1. Allocated Funds shall be distributed only for expenses that are eligible under N.C. Gen. Stat. §62A-40 *et seq.* and the policies of the 911 Board.
 - 5.2. Administrative costs are not allowable expenses.
 - 5.3 Annually, the AGENCY and CMPD shall develop an agreed upon budget identifying eligible 911 expenses for CMPD as the Primary PSAP and a separate budget for the AGENCY as the Secondary PSAP. Each budget will identify the anticipated maintenance and operations expenses of the emergency dispatch and communications system, facilities and accessories for the coming fiscal year for the AGENCY and CMPD systems. Eligible 911 expenses submitted by the CMPD as the Primary PSAP to the 911 Board will not be subject to this Agreement.
 - 5.4 The AGENCY shall provide its list of eligible 911 expenses to the CMPD for submission to the 911 Board as specified below. The 911 Board will provide disbursement of Allocated Funds to the CMPD for the eligible 911 expenses of the AGENCY based on the 911 Board's eligible expenditure list.
 - 5.5. The AGENCY shall provide the City with three (3) quarterly reports and an annual report to receive reimbursement. The quarterly report, submitted by the AGENCY no later than the 20th day following the close of the end of each quarter, will consist of one completed Revenue-Expenditure Form

- invoices for all expenses listed and general ledger proof of payment and other documents as may be required by the 911 Board. The AGENCY shall be reimbursed quarterly up to the Allocated Funds held by the CMPD at the time.
- 5.6. The final report will be due to the CMPD no later than August 8th of each calendar year. The report will be submitted to the 911 Board for approval. Any amount of Allocated Funds distributed to the AGENCY which are not approved by the 911 Board will be set-off from the AGENCY'S Allocated Funds for the subsequent year.
- 5.7 Should the CMPD receive a request from the 911 Board for additional information relating to the AGENCY'S operations or expenses, the AGENCY will promptly (within thirty (30) days or within time period requested by 911 Board) provide the information requested to the CMPD for delivery to the 911 Board.
- 5.8. The Parties will maintain full, accurate, and verifiable accounting records to support the preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting practices applicable to N.C. local governments as approved by, or consistent with, standards of the Local Government Commission.
- 5.9. In the event the AGENCY breaches any of the terms contained in this Agreement, or the 911 Board determines that the AGENCY has made material misrepresentations in any document received by the 911 Board; the AGENCY shall return any un-distributed Allocated Funds held by the AGENCY. The AGENCY'S obligations that are created by this subsection to return Allocated Funds apply only to Allocated Funds held by the AGENCY. Allocated Funds are "held" by the AGENCY only to the extent they are in the actual, not constructive, possession of the AGENCY. The AGENCY understands that the 911 Board may set-off Allocated Funds for the subsequent year upon a breach of this Agreement or the 911 Board's determination that expenditures were not eligible for reimbursement under State law or 911 Board policies.
- 5.10 The AGENCY understands that CMPD will be required to enforce subsection 5.9 by the 911 Board and that CMPD has no discretion to vary the requirements or to seek any exception to the decision(s) of the 911 Board.
- 5.11 The Parties are required to attend workshops or other instructional sessions relating to administration of the Grant and use of the 911 Funds provided by the 911 Board during the term of this Agreement.

6. INDEPENDENT STATUS OF PARTIES.

- 6.1. It is agreed between the Parties that neither this Agreement nor any provisions hereof shall be deemed to create a partnership or joint venture between or among the CMPD the AGENCY or with the 911 Board.
- 6.2. The Parties acknowledge that they are each independent entities. Neither Party shall represent itself as an agent of the other; nor shall the Agreement be construed so as to make either party an agent of the 911 Board. Neither Party shall have the ability to bind the other Party or the 911 Board to any agreement for payment of goods or services, nor shall it represent to any person or entity that it has such ability.

7. RECORDS, RECORDS RETENTION.

- 7.1. The AGENCY shall maintain full, accurate and verifiable financial records, supporting documents, and all other pertinent data consistent with the 911 Board's funding model and policies.
- 7.2. The AGENCY shall retain all financial records, supporting documents, and all other pertinent records related to this Agreement for five (5) years from the termination of this Agreement. In the event such records are audited, all such records shall be retained beyond the five-year period until any and all audit findings have been resolved.
- 7.3. Pursuant to N.C. Gen. Stat. §143C-6-23, and §147-64.7, the AGENCY agrees to make available to the CMPD for the State Auditor, or designated representatives of the foregoing, all of its records requested, and agrees to allow the 911 Board or its representative to audit, examine and copy any and all requested data, documents, proceedings, records and notes of activity. Access to these records shall be allowed upon request at any time during normal business hours and as often as the State Auditor or 911 Board or its representative may deem necessary.
- 7.4. The AGENCY acknowledges and agrees that it will be subject to the audit and reporting requirements prescribed by N.C. Gen. Stat. § 143C-6-23 et seq., and The Local Government and Fiscal Control Act Annual Independent Audit, Rules, N.C. Gen. Stat. §62A-40 et seq. and the policies, procedures and rules of the 911 Board; as applicable.

8. TERMINATION; AVAILABILITY OF FUNDS.

8.1. If the AGENCY fails for any reason to fulfill in a timely and proper manner its obligations under this Agreement, the CMPD shall thereupon have the right to terminate this Agreement by giving written notice to the AGENCY of such termination and by specifying the effective date of termination. In such event, the CMPD shall have no responsibility to make additional payments under this Agreement after the Termination Date. The AGENCY shall not be relieved of liability to the CMPD for

- damages sustained by the CMPD by virtue of any breach of this Agreement.
- 8.2. The CMPD may terminate this Agreement immediately upon notice to the AGENCY at any time if sufficient Allocated Funds are not available from the 911 Board.
- 8.3. Either party may terminate this Agreement upon sixty (60) days' notice, or by mutual consent as may be agreed. Notice may be given by either party to the other at the addresses and to the attention of the Party's representative specified below.
- 8.4. Termination of this Agreement by the AGENCY shall not prohibit the CMPD from seeking remedy for additional costs consequential to the termination, which are incurred by the CMPD from the 911 Board. The AGENCY shall repay to the CMPD which will then be forwarded to the 911 Board any Allocated Funds received in excess of such distributions due under this Agreement.
- 8.5. The Parties recognizes that the expenditure of money deposited in the State treasury, including the 911 Fund, is subject to acts of appropriation by the General Assembly and actions of the Budget Director.
- 9. LIABILITIES AND LOSS. Neither Party assumes liability, nor shall it have any liability under this Agreement, with respect to accidents, bodily injury, illness, or third party breach of contract, or any other damages, claims, or losses arising out of any activities undertaken by the other Party or its contractors.
- 10. REMEDIES. In the event of the AGENCY'S non-compliance with any provision in this Agreement or the AGENCY'S failure to adhere to the policies, rules and statutes of the 911 Board, or the provisions of this Agreement, the CMPD may take any actions authorized by the policies, rules and statutes of the 911 Board or by this Agreement. These remedies include, but are not limited to, reducing or suspending Allocated Funds or terminating such, including the withdrawal of all funds described in this Agreement except for funds already expended on otherwise eligible expenditures. However, no termination of this Agreement removes the reporting and records retention requirements of this Agreement.
- 11. AGENCY'S REPRESENTATION AND WARRANTIES. The AGENCY hereby represents and warrants that:
 - 11.1. The AGENCY is a Secondary PSAP and duly organized and validly existing as joint governmental agency under the laws of the State of North Carolina.
 - 11.2. This Agreement constitutes a binding obligation of the AGENCY enforceable against it in accordance with its terms. The execution and delivery of this Agreement have been duly authorized by all necessary

- action on the part of the AGENCY and does not violate any applicable organizational documents of the AGENCY or any agreement or undertaking to which it is a party or by which it is bound.
- 11.3. There is no action, suit, proceeding, or investigation at law or in equity or before any court, public board or body pending, or to the AGENCY'S knowledge, threatened against or affecting it, that could or might adversely affect any of the transactions contemplated by this Agreement or the validity or enforceability of this Agreement or the AGENCY'S ability to discharge its obligations under this Agreement.
- 11.4. All consents or approvals necessary from any governmental authority as a condition to the execution and delivery of this Agreement have been obtained by the AGENCY.
- 11.5. The parties will notify the Executive Director of any significant problems relating to the administrative or financial aspects associated with the Allocated Funds, such as misappropriation of funds; use of 911 Funds for non-eligible expenses; placement or retaining 911 funds in any account other than the Emergency System Telephone Fund.
- 12. EXCUSABLE DELAY (FORCE MAJEURE). Neither Party shall be liable for any failure or delay in performing any of its obligations under this Agreement that is due to causes beyond its reasonable control, such as, but not limited to, acts of God, earthquakes and other natural catastrophes, governmental acts, shortages of supplies, riots, war, fire, epidemics, delays in common carriers, labor strikes or other difficulties or circumstances beyond its reasonable control. The AGENCY shall notify the CMPD promptly of any factor, occurrence or event that comes to its attention that may affect or delay the AGENCY's ability to perform any of its other obligations hereunder. The obligations and rights of the excused party shall be extended on a day to day basis for the time period equal to the period of the excusable delay.
- 13. DISPUTE RESOLUTION. The Parties agree that it is in their mutual interest to resolve disputes informally. The Parties shall negotiate in good faith and use all reasonable efforts to resolve such dispute(s). During the time the Parties are attempting to resolve any dispute, each shall proceed diligently to perform their respective duties and responsibilities under this Agreement. If a dispute cannot be resolved between the Parties within thirty (30) days after delivery of notice, either Party may elect to exercise any other remedies available under this Agreement, or at law; or invite the other party to submit the matter to mediation. Provided, however, that this term shall not constitute an agreement by either Party to mediate or arbitrate any dispute; and that any agreement to mediate may be revoked or terminated without penalty therefore if so advised by either Party's legal counsel.

- 14. CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION. The Parties acknowledge and agree that each is subject to the N.C. Public Records Act, which is set forth in N.C. General Statutes 132-1, et seq. Proprietary information may be subject to N.C. Gen. Stat. §62A-52. The AGENCY shall ensure that any third party is encouraged to review the applicable laws prior to submitting any information or documentation believed to be proprietary, and that any proprietary information is properly identified at the time of receipt.
 - 14.1. The Parties shall maintain the confidentiality of certain types of information described in N.C. Gen. Stat. §132-1, et seq. and N.C. Gen. Stat. §62A-52. Such information may include trade secrets defined by N.C. Gen. Stat. §66-152 and other information exempted from disclosures pursuant to the Public Records Act pursuant to N.C. Gen. Stat. §132-1.2.
 - 14.2. The CMPD may serve as custodian of confidential information and not as an arbiter of claims against an assertion of confidentiality. If an action is brought pursuant to N.C. Gen. Stat. §132-9 to compel disclosure information marked confidential, the disclosing each Party agrees that it will provide prompt notice of such action, intervene in the action through its counsel and participate in defending the Parties, including any public official(s) or public employee(s). The CMPD shall have no liability to the AGENCY or any third party with respect to the disclosure of confidential information ordered by a court of competent jurisdiction pursuant to N.C. Gen. Stat. §132-9 or other applicable law; nor by disclosure of unmarked information or information that is publicly known.
- 15. NOTICE. All notices required or permitted to be delivered hereunder and all communications in respect hereof shall be in writing and shall be deemed given when personally delivered by one or more of the following: when deposited in the United States mails, first class, postage prepaid and properly addressed, by facsimile, or by e-mail, as follows:

16. CONSTRUCTION. This Agreement shall be construed and governed by the laws of the State of North Carolina. The place of this Agreement, its situs and forum, shall be Mecklenburg County, North Carolina, where all matters, whether sounding in contract or in tort, relating to its validity, construction, interpretation and enforcement shall be determined. The Parties agree and submit, solely for matters relating to this Contract, to the jurisdiction of the courts of the State of North Carolina, and stipulate that Mecklenburg County shall be the proper venue for all matters.

17. GENERAL PROVISIONS AND CONDITIONS.

- 17.1 The 911 Board may request CMPD to provide certain AGENCY information that will assist the 911 Board with evaluation of the short and long-range impact of its Secondary PSAP program. The AGENCY recognizes that such requests may occur after termination of this Agreement and agrees, to the extent possible, to provide to the 911 Board such information as requested.
- 17.2 Nondiscrimination. The Parties agree not to discriminate by reason of age, race, religion, color, sex, national origin, or handicap related to the activities of this Agreement.
- 17.3 Conflict of Interest. The Parties certify that to the best of their respective knowledge, none of their employees or officers have any pecuniary interest in the business of the 911 Board or Allocated Funds, and that no person associated with either Party has any interest that would conflict in any manner with the performance of this Agreement.

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- 17.4 Compliance with Laws. The Parties shall at all times observe and comply with all laws, ordinances, and regulation of the state, federal and local governments which may affect the performance of the Agreement.
- 17.5 Non-Assignability. The AGENCY shall not assign any interest in the Agreement and shall not transfer any interest in the same without prior written consent of the CMPD and the 911 Board.
- 17.6 Future Cooperation. The Parties agree to cooperate fully with one another, to execute any and all supplementary documents and/or agreements that may be necessary or helpful to give full force and effect to the terms of this Agreement and to the Parties' intentions in entering this Agreement.
- 18. Entire Agreement. This Agreement supersedes all and expresses the entire understanding of the Parties with respect to the transactions contemplated herein, and shall not be amended, modified or altered except pursuant to a writing signed by both Parties.

INTRALOCAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN CHARLOTTE-MECKLENBURG POLICE DEPARTMENT AND CHARLOTTE FIRE DEPARTMENT

THIS INTRALOCAL AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made effective the 1st day of July 2014 by and between the CHARLOTTE-MECKLENBURG POLICE DEPARTMENT ("CMPD"), and the CHARLOTTE FIRE DEPARTMENT ("CFD"), both Departments of the CITY OF CHARLOTTE ("City") a municipal corporation organized under the State of North Carolina.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the 911 Board was created by SL 2007-383 (N.C. Gen. Stat.§62A-40 et seq.) to collect and administer the 911 Fund; and

WHEREAS, the 911 Board adopted a policy allowing allocation of distributions from the 911 Fund for eligible expenditures of a Secondary Public Safety Answering Point ("Secondary PSAP") that is able to receive the voice and data of an Enhanced 911 call transferred from a Primary PSAP and to complete the call taking process dispatching law, medical, fire or other responder; and

WHEREAS, the CMPD as a Primary PSAP presently transfers 911 calls to the CFD, a Secondary PSAP, which relieves the CMPD from completing the call taking process and dispatching such 911 calls; and

WHEREAS, the CMPD and the CFD operate within the same 911 System and the CMPD desire distributions from the 911 Fund to further distribute for the benefit of the CFD; and

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to contract in accordance with the Secondary PSAP funding policies, rules, and regulations of the 911 Board;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the undersigned Parties agree as follows:

- 1. DEFINITIONS. The following terms shall have the following meanings for purposes of this Contract (including all Exhibits). Definitions not defined below which are set forth in N.C. Gen. Stat. §62A-40 *et seq.* are incorporated herein.
 - 1.1. "Back-up PSAP": means a facility equipped to operate as part of the 911 System and all other features of its associated Primary PSAP. A Backup PSAP receives 911 calls only when they are transferred from the Primary

- PSAP or on an alternate routing basis when calls cannot be completed to the Primary PSAP.
- 1.2. "Interoperable": Capability of the telephone systems of the Primary and Secondary PSAPs to ensure complete transfer of a 911 call.
- 1.3. "Secondary PSAP Funding Policy": means Exhibit A to this Agreement and as the Policy may be amended.
- 1.4. "Secondary PSAP": is able to receive the voice and data of an Enhanced 911 call transferred from a Primary PSAP and complete the call taking process dispatching law, medical, fire or other responder. Receiving the voice and data of an Enhanced 911 call includes all identification and location data generated by the Subscriber.
- 1.5. "Executive Director": the Executive Director of the 911 Board.
- 1.6. "Allocated Funds": the amount authorized by the 911 Board for distribution to the CMPD for further allocation to the CFD determined annually based on a "per 911 call basis" as measured by the Electronic Call Analysis Tracking System. These Allocated Funds shall not diminish the monthly base amount distribution to the CMPD, nor modify the CMPD's carry-forward pursuant to N.C.G.S. §62A-46(b1).
- 1.7. "State Funds": Any funds appropriated by the N.C. General Assembly or collected by the State of North Carolina. The 911 Funds are State Funds. The Parties recognizes that the expenditure of money deposited in the State treasury, including the 911 Fund, is subject to acts of appropriation by the General Assembly and actions of the Budget Director.
- 1.8. "Unit of Local Government": As defined in N.C. Gen. Stat. §160A-460, means a county, city, consolidated city-county, local board of education, sanitary district, facility authority created under Article 20 of Chapter 160A of the General Statutes, special district created under Article 43 of Chapter 105 of the General Statutes, or other local political subdivision, authority, or agency of local government.

SECONDARY PSAP.

- 2.1. The Secondary PSAP to receive the Allocated Funds is operated by the Charlotte Fire Department and receives 911 calls transferred from CMPD, the Primary PSAP, to complete the call taking and dispatching process. The Parties agree and acknowledge that the conditions set forth in Exhibit A, the 911 Board's Secondary PSAP Funding Policy, must be satisfied.
- 2.2. Allocated Funds shall be determined by the 911 Board and utilize call data from the CMPD. Allocated Funds shall not be available for Back-up PSAPs.

- 2.3. This Agreement will be provided to the Executive Director prior to disbursement of the Allocated Funds from the 911 Fund.
- 2.4. 911 System equipment may be procured by the CMPD and placed within either the CMPD or the CFD by consent of the parties; provided that such equipment used to complete the call taking and dispatch processes shall be interoperable if purchased by the Primary PSAP; e.g. Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD).
- 2.5. To the greatest extent practicable, expenditures of the Allocated Funds shall be made to ensure greater interoperability in call taking, processing and dispatching appropriate responders.
- 2.6. The CMPD will collect and compile documents required to be provided by the CFD as directed by the 911 Board for the purpose of verifying the requirements of the Secondary PSAP Funding Policy.
- 2.7. The CFD shall assist the CMPD in any audits of the 911 Fund by supplying required document(s) to satisfy the requests of an auditor.

CHANGES IN FUND DISTRIBUTIONS.

- 3.1. The Parties acknowledge that if changes are requested with respect to 911 Fund distributions or allocations, such changes must be authorized in writing by the 911 Board. The Parties understand the 911 Board will not approve any changes that exceed its authority under N.C. Gen. Stat. §62A-40 et seq., or subsequent modification thereof.
- 3.2. The CFD may carry forward Allocated Funds for eligible expenditures for capital outlay, capital improvements, or equipment replacement. Amounts carried forward to the next fiscal year from Allocated Funds made by the 911 Board may not be used to lower the Allocated Funds unless the amount is greater than twenty percent (20%) of the average yearly amount distributed to the CFD in the prior two years. The 911 Board may allow the CFD to carry forward a greater amount without changing the CFD'S Allocated Funds.
- 3.3. Administrative expenses or costs of the Parties are not eligible expenses for 911 Fund distributions.
- 3.4. Each Party shall immediately notify the other of any change in conditions or applicable law, or any other event, which may significantly affect its ability to perform its obligations under this Agreement.
- 3.5. The Parties agree that the CMPD, as a Primary PSAP, may assign this Agreement to its successor or continue the Agreement by amending the term if restructuring of City/County government and/or legislation is enacted that does, or may, affect the term of this Agreement.

- 3.6. A request for change in the allocation of funds by the CFD must be submitted to the CMPD in writing to forward to the Executive Director. The Request must comply with the 911 Board's policies and state the basis for the request. The Request must be submitted at the same time that CMPD as a Primary PSAP would submit its requests for additional funds. The CFD shall submit a revised budget and any other documentation or information requested by the Executive Director to the CMPD indicating the planned use of such additional funds.
- 4. TERM. The term of this Agreement shall commence on July 1, 2014 (the "Effective Date") and automatically renew for an additional one (1) year term, unless otherwise terminated or amended as provided herein. Allocated Funds provided by the 911 Board may not be utilized for expenses incurred by the Parties prior to the Effective Date or subsequent to the termination of this Agreement.
- 5. DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDS. Allocated Funds will be delivered to the CMPD together with the monthly base amount distributed to the CMPD.
 - 5.1. Allocated Funds shall be distributed only for expenses that are eligible under N.C. Gen. Stat. §62A-40 *et seq.*, and the policies of the 911 Board.
 - 5.2. Administrative costs are not allowable expenses.
 - 5.3 Annually, the CFD and CMPD shall develop an agreed upon budget identifying eligible 911 expenses for CMPD as the Primary PSAP and a separate budget for the CFD as the Secondary PSAP. Each budget will identify the anticipated maintenance and operations expenses of the emergency dispatch and communications system, facilities and accessories for the coming fiscal year for the CFD and CMPD systems. The CFD understands that the 911 Board may set-off Allocated Funds for the subsequent year upon breach of this Agreement or the 911 Board's determination that expenditures were not eligible for reimbursement under State law or 911 Board policies.
- 5.10 The CFD understands that CMPD will be required to enforce subsection 5.9 by the 911 Board and that CMPD has no discretion to vary the requirements or to seek any exception to the decision(s) of the 911 Board.
- 5.11 The Parties are required to attend workshops or other instructional sessions relating to administration of the Grant and use of the 911 Funds provided by the 911 Board during the term of this Agreement.

INDEPENDENT STATUS OF PARTIES.

- 6.1. It is agreed between the Parties that neither this Agreement nor any provisions hereof shall be deemed to create a partnership or joint venture between or among the CMPD the CFD or with the 911 Board.
- 6.2. The Parties acknowledge that they are each independent departments.

 Neither Party shall represent itself as an agent of the other; nor shall the Agreement be construed so as to make either party an agent of the 911 Board. Neither Party shall have the ability to bind the other Party or the

911 Board to any agreement for payment of goods or services, nor shall it represent to any person or entity that it has such ability.

RECORDS, RECORDS RETENTION.

- 7.1. The CFD shall maintain full, accurate and verifiable financial records, supporting documents, and all other pertinent data consistent with the 911 Board's funding model and policies.
- 7.2. The CFD shall retain all financial records, supporting documents, and all other pertinent records related to this Agreement for five (5) years from the termination of this Agreement. In the event such records are audited, all such records shall be retained beyond the five-year period until any and all audit findings have been resolved.
- 7.3. Pursuant to N.C. Gen. Stat. §143C-6-23, and §147-64.7, the CFD agrees to make available to the CMPD for the State Auditor, or designated representatives of the foregoing, all of its records requested, and agrees to allow the 911 Board or its representative to audit, examine and copy any and all requested data, documents, proceedings, records and notes of activity. Access to these records shall be allowed upon request at any time during normal business hours and as often as the State Auditor or 911 Board or its representative may deem necessary.
- 7.4. The CFD acknowledges and agrees that it will be subject to the audit and reporting requirements prescribed by N.C. Gen. Stat. § 143C-6-23 et seq., and The Local Government and Fiscal Control Act Annual Independent Audit, Rules, N.C. Gen. Stat. §62A-40 et seq. and the policies, procedures and rules of the 911 Board; as applicable.

8. TERMINATION; AVAILABILITY OF FUNDS.

- 8.1. If the CFD fails for any reason to fulfill in a timely and proper manner its obligations under this Agreement, the CMPD shall thereupon have the right to terminate this Agreement by giving written notice to the CFD of such termination and by specifying the effective date of termination. In such event, the CMPD shall have no responsibility to make additional payments under this Agreement after the Termination Date. The CFD shall return all undistributed Allocated Funds to the CMPD without the demand therefor. The CFD shall not be relieved of liability to the CMPD for damages sustained by the CMPD by virtue of any breach of this Agreement.
- 8.2. The CMPD may terminate this Agreement immediately upon notice to the CFD at any time if sufficient Allocated Funds are not available from the 911 Board.

- 8.3. Either party may terminate this Agreement upon sixty (60) days' notice, or by mutual consent as may be agreed. Notice may be given by either party to the other at the addresses and to the attention of the Party's representative specified below.
- 8.4. Termination of this Agreement by the CFD shall not prohibit the CMPD from seeking remedy for additional costs consequential to the termination, which are incurred by the CMPD from the 911 Board. The CFD shall repay to the CMPD which will then be forwarded to the 911 Board any Allocated Funds received in excess of such distributions due under this Agreement.
- 8.5. The Parties recognizes that the expenditure of money deposited in the State treasury, including the 911 Fund, is subject to acts of appropriation by the General Assembly and actions of the Budget Director.
- 9. LIABILITIES AND LOSS. Neither Party assumes liability, nor shall it have any liability under this Agreement, with respect to accidents, bodily injury, illness, or third party breach of contract, or any other damages, claims, or losses arising out of any activities undertaken by the other party or its contractors.
- 10. REMEDIES. In the event of the CFD'S non-compliance with any provision in this Agreement or the CFD'S failure to adhere to the policies, rules and statutes of the 911 Board, or the provisions of this Agreement, the CMPD may take any actions authorized by the policies, rules and statutes of the 911 Board or by this Agreement. These remedies include, but are not limited to, reducing or suspending Allocated Funds or terminating such, including the withdrawal of all funds described in this Agreement except for funds already expended on otherwise eligible expenditures. However, no termination of this Agreement removes the reporting and records retention requirements of this Agreement.
- 11. CFD'S REPRESENTATION AND WARRANTIES. The CFD hereby represents and warrants that:
 - 11.1. The CFD is a Secondary PSAP and duly organized and validly existing as Department of the City of Charlotte a municipal corporation under the laws of the State of North Carolina.
 - 11.2. This Agreement constitutes a binding obligation of the CFD enforceable against it in accordance with its terms. The execution and delivery of this Agreement have been duly authorized by all necessary action on the part of the CFD and does not violate any applicable organizational documents of the CFD or any agreement or undertaking to which it is a party or by which it is bound.
 - 11.3. There is no action, suit, proceeding, or investigation at law or in equity or before any court, public board or body pending, or to the CFD'S knowledge, threatened against or affecting it, that could or might

- adversely affect any of the transactions contemplated by this Agreement or the validity or enforceability of this Agreement or the CFD'S ability to discharge its obligations under this Agreement.
- 11.4. All consents or approvals necessary from any governmental authority as a condition to the execution and delivery of this Agreement have been obtained by the CFD.
- 11.5. The parties will notify the Executive Director of any significant problems relating to the administrative or financial aspects associated with the Allocated Funds, such as misappropriation of funds; use of 911 Funds for non-eligible expenses; placement or retaining 911 funds in any account other than the Emergency System Telephone Fund.
- 12. EXCUSABLE DELAY (FORCE MAJEURE). Neither Party shall be liable for any failure or delay in performing any of its obligations under this Agreement that is due to causes beyond its reasonable control, such as, but not limited to, acts of God, earthquakes and other natural catastrophes, governmental acts, shortages of supplies, riots, war, fire, epidemics, delays in common carriers, labor strikes or other difficulties or circumstances beyond its reasonable control. The CFD shall notify the CMPD promptly of any factor, occurrence or event that comes to its attention that may affect or delay the CFD's ability to perform any of its other obligations hereunder. The obligations and rights of the excused party shall be extended on a day to day basis for the time period equal to the period of the excusable delay.
- 13. DISPUTE RESOLUTION. The Parties agree that it is in their mutual interest to resolve disputes informally. The Parties shall negotiate in good faith and use all reasonable efforts to resolve such dispute(s). During the time the Parties are attempting to resolve any dispute, each shall proceed diligently to perform their respective duties and responsibilities under this Agreement. If a dispute cannot be resolved between the Parties within thirty (30) days after delivery of notice, either Party may elect to exercise any other remedies available under this Agreement, or at law; or invite the other party to submit the matter to mediation. Provided, however, that this term shall not constitute an agreement by either Party to mediate or arbitrate any dispute; and that any agreement to mediate may be revoked or terminated without penalty therefore if so advised by either Party's legal counsel.
- 14. CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION. The Parties acknowledge and agree that each is subject to the N.C. Public Records Act, which is set forth in N.C. General Statutes 132-1, et seq. Proprietary information may be subject to N.C. Gen. Stat. §62A-52. The CFD shall ensure that any third party is encouraged to review the applicable laws prior to submitting any information or documentation believed to be proprietary, and that any proprietary information is properly identified at the time of receipt.

- 14.1. The Parties shall maintain the confidentiality of certain types of information described in N.C. Gen. Stat. §132-1, et seq. and N.C. Gen. Stat. §62A-52. Such information may include trade secrets defined by N.C. Gen. Stat. §66-152 and other information exempted from disclosures pursuant to the Public Records Act pursuant to N.C. Gen. Stat. §132-1.2.
- 14.2. The CMPD may serve as custodian of confidential information and not as an arbiter of claims against an assertion of confidentiality. If an action is brought pursuant to N.C. Gen. Stat. §132-9 to compel disclosure information marked confidential, the disclosing each Party agrees that it will provide prompt notice of such action, intervene in the action through its counsel and participate in defending the Parties, including any public official(s) or public employee(s). The CMPD shall have no liability to the CFD or any third party with respect to the disclosure of confidential information ordered by a court of competent jurisdiction pursuant to N.C. Gen. Stat. §132-9 or other applicable law; nor by disclosure of unmarked information or information that is publicly known.
- 15. NOTICE. All notices required or permitted to be delivered hereunder and all communications in respect hereof shall be in writing and shall be deemed given when personally delivered by one or more of the following: when deposited in the United States mails, first class, postage prepaid and properly addressed, by facsimile, or by e-mail, as follows:

16. CONSTRUCTION. This Agreement shall be construed and governed by the laws of the State of North Carolina. The place of this Agreement, its situs and forum, shall be Mecklenburg County, North Carolina, where all matters, whether sounding in contract or in tort, relating to its validity, construction, interpretation and enforcement shall be determined. The Parties agree and submit, solely for matters relating to this Contract, to the jurisdiction of the courts of the State of North Carolina, and stipulate that Mecklenburg County shall be the proper venue for all matters.

17. GENERAL PROVISIONS AND CONDITIONS.


- 17.1 The 911 Board may request CMPD to provide certain CFD information that will assist the 911 Board with evaluation of the short and long-range impact of its Secondary PSAP program. The CFD recognizes that such requests may occur after termination of this Agreement and agrees, to the extent possible, to provide to the 91I Board such information as requested.
- 17.2 Nondiscrimination. The Parties agree not to discriminate by reason of age, race, religion, color, sex, national origin, or handicap related to the activities of this Agreement.
- 17.3 Conflict of Interest. The Parties certify that to the best of their respective knowledge, none of their employees or officers have any pecuniary interest in the business of the 911 Board or Allocated Funds, and that no person associated with either Party has any interest that would conflict in any manner with the performance of this Agreement.
- 17.4 Compliance with Laws. The Parties shall at all times observe and comply with all laws, ordinances, and regulation of the state, federal and local governments which may affect the performance of the Agreement.
- 17.5 Non-Assignability. The CFD shall not assign any interest in this Agreement and shall not transfer any interest in the same without prior written consent of the CMPD and the 911 Board.

- 17.6 Future Cooperation. The Parties agree to cooperate fully with one another, to execute any and all supplementary documents and/or agreements that may be necessary or helpful to give full force and effect to the terms of this Agreement and to the Parties' intentions in entering this Agreement.
- 18. Entire Agreement. This Agreement supersedes all and expresses the entire understanding of the Parties with respect to the transactions contemplated herein, and shall not be amended, modified or altered except pursuant to a writing signed by both Parties.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the undersigned parties, through their duly authorized representatives, have caused this Agreement to be executed as of the effective date set forth above.


