

RED MAPLE

ACER RUBRUM

Red maple is a well known shade tree, named for its often red autumn leaf display. Overplanted in Charlotte, its use is now limited during development. Leaves can vary from 3- to 5-lobed, with lobes separated by V-shaped angles. Male trees have pinkish red flowers in early spring, and females produce red samaras.





Deciduous



SIZE:

70 feet high 50 feet wide



SUN:

Full sun, part shade, full shade



FLOWERS:

Small red flowers in dense clusters appear before leaves emerge.



USDA ZONES:

3-9



ID TIPS:

Maples have opposite branching structure.



WILDLIFE VALUE:

Cecropia moth (Hyalophora cecropia) favors the red maple.



INTERESTING FACT:

Ink and cinnamonbrown and black dyes were made from a bark extract by early settlers.
