The Charlotte Neighborhood Equity and Stabilization Commission is established for a 3-year period beginning in 2022 and is charged with reviewing and recommending specific anti-displacement strategies and specific tools for protecting residents of moderate to high vulnerability of displacement.


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## **Initial Workplan**

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### Focusing on NEST is not new

- While neighborhood change and housing affordability has accelerated recently, neighborhood equity, stabilization and anti-displacement initiatives are not new
- Council has long prioritized this work through City programs and services, laying a strong NEST foundation
- Enhancements to programs and services are developed and implemented an on ongoing basis as needs and resource gaps are identified

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## Current Programs Affordable Housing

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### **Housing Continuum**

- ¬The City provides a continuum of housing services that meets residents in their current housing situation with a goal of movement towards stability.
- ¬FY 2021: Across the continuum of housing initiatives: Approximately 9,500 persons were assisted totaling \$31,293,765 of investment.

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#### **Rent & Relocation**

- Rental assistance programs provide varying levels of assistance to households working towards housing sustainability.
- Rental assistance programs range from short-term assistance to multi-year vouchers.
- ¬The city provides voluntary relocation assistance for renter households with unresolved code violations.
- Several programs are available to assist with utility/rent deposits and arrears.

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## **Housing Rehabilitation**

- Housing rehabilitation protects households from displacement and increases health and safety for low- and moderate-income homeowners.
- City programs provide a range of repairs from emergency assistance to moderate rehabilitation.
- ¬Typical repairs include roofing, plumbing, electrical, HVAC, handicap accessibility and energy efficient retrofits.
- City rehabilitation programs also test for lead paint. If found, home are made lead safe.

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#### **Preservation & New Construction**

- Charlotte partners with developers and nonprofit organizations to build and renovate affordable housing developments.
- Since 2002, \$218 million has been invested in 10,869 units and 888 shelter beds.
- The city is using innovative new tools to continue providing new housing opportunities such as city owned land and rental subsidies.

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#### Homeownership

- HouseCharlotte, the city's homeownership assistance program, provides qualifying homebuyers funding for down payment, closing costs or interest rate buydowns.
- Housing education and counseling is a critical component of the overall homeownership strategy. Classes and oneon-one counseling are required to receive assistance.
- Funding is also provided to bring new units to market using various programs and approaches.
- Homeownership remains a major source of wealth building and economic mobility.

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# Current Programs Neighborhood Capacity & Engagement

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## **Keys to Getting Things Done**

- Neighborhood Board Retreats professional facilitation for neighborhoods & merchant organizations to define and prioritize goals & develop action plans.
- ¬Neighborhood & Individual Training- 35+ live and on-demand workshops. Examples include:
  - · Organizing,
  - Conflict resolution,
  - · Understanding affordable housing,
  - Emergency preparedness, and
  - Ongoing Need-a-Speaker Series with 45+ topics



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## Ideas to Action – Community Grants



- Neighborhood Matching Grants incentivizes capacity and social infrastructure development with grants ≤ \$25k for low- and moderate-income neighborhoods.
- Neighbors are the real 1st responders.
- Community-led projects include public safety, beautification, literacy, mentoring, bike & pedestrian infrastructure, signage, branding, legal & strategic support, gardens, festivals, façade improvement and more.
- 97%+ approval rate, technical support provided.
- Special grants- Placemaking, Little Free Pantries, MVP, NNO and more.

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### Support to Succeed

- Service Area Liaisons advocates, organizers, connectors, problem solvers and technical support for individuals and organizations citywide.
- ¬Mayor's Mentoring Alliance training, networking and promotion for mentor agencies to enhance academic, social, and economic prospects for youth.
- Neighborhood Organization Contact List (NOCL) - invites neighborhoods & others to subscribe to remain informed about grants, rezoning activity, workshops, programs, events and more.



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## Current Programs Pride & Beautification

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## Keep Charlotte Beautiful (KCB)

- ¬Facilitates 350+ volunteer orgs to provide street cleaning assistance through the Adopt-a-City Street Program.
- ¬Provides free supplies for neighborhood, park, dump sites
  and other clean-ups, regardless of program participation.
- ⊲Educates about recycling, waste management, tree care and litter remediation.
- Offers beautification and tree canopy care grants.
- Hosts annual improvement projects as part of the Great American Clean-up.

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## Current Programs Utility Support (Charlotte Water)

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#### **Charlotte Water Cares**

- Charlotte Water Cares Team a group of trained customer service professionals dedicated to working one-on-one with customers with financial needs.
  - Cares Team members review accounts before disconnection orders are released as a final effort to avoid service interruption.
  - More than 24,000 calls in 2021 to past-due customers.
  - Three community events held in 2021 to assist customers in-person.




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#### **Charlotte Water Cares**

- Flexible payment arrangements.
- Leak adjustment policy.
- Financial assistance partnerships with dozens of non-profit organizations.
- HomeServe partnership to offer reduced cost repair services.
- Zero interest service line replacement loans.



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## Current Programs Workforce Development

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## **Workforce Development**

#### **RENEW**

- ¬Paid (\$15hr) skilled training preparing Charlotte residents for careers in HVAC and electrical.
- 13 to 16 weeks of classes offered through Urban League and Goodwill.
- Corporate partnerships for training and potential full-time placement.
- Provides lunch-and-learns, mentorship, and career preparedness.

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## **Workforce Development**

#### Mayor's Youth Employment Program (MYEP)

- Provides equitable career development opportunities to build social capital and enhance economic mobility.
- Youth receive Job & Career Readiness Training, paid summer internships and professional workplace experience.
- ¬Internships offer <u>at least</u> 25 hours/week for six (6) weeks at \$10/hour (\$1,500 minimum).
- Youth are matched to 83 employers (FY22) based on needs, interests, skills and proximity.
- Achieves lasting relationships, skills and permanent employment opportunities.

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## Current Programs Corridors of Opportunity

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## **Corridors of Opportunity**

- ¬Targets resources and investments in six priority corridors.
- Specific actions tailored to each corridor's unique needs and character of economy and community goals.
- Economic development focus: small business support, workforce development and public/private partnerships.
- ¬\$38.5 million in City of Charlotte funding.
- Private sector engagement and support.

#### **Six Key Corridors**

- Beatties Ford Road/Rozzelles Ferry Road
- ® Central Avenue/Albemarle Road
- ® Freedom Drive/Wilkinson Boulevard
- Sugar Creek Road/I-85
- **West Boulevard**



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## Current Programs Business Support

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## **Business Support**

#### **BUSINESS MATCHING GRANT PROGRAM**

- ¬Available to businesses and commercial property owners making improvements to their buildings/business.
- ⊲Grants for exterior façade, interior rehab, security enhancements, and organized business districts.
- Brownfield grants are available for qualifying brownfield properties.
- ¬MWSBE architecture/contractor utilization bonus.

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## **Business Support**

#### **AMP UP CLT**

- ¬Business growth program that prepares Charlotte's minority business owners for expansion.
- ¬Basic eligibility requirements include:
  - 51% ethnic minority business ownership
  - \$175,000 annual revenue
  - At least two employees
  - In business at least two years

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
## Putting It All Together Staying in Place Pilot Program

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## **Staying In Place Overview**



#### Staying in Place Approach:

- Focus is on providing an opportunity for residents who want to stay in place, to stay in place.
- Take a holistic view of a home/property and residents need.
- Engage community before making investments and throughout project.
- Cross-department approach.

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#### 2040 Policy Map | Next Steps



#### **Purpose**


A **neighborhood-based approach to more detailed planning** to provide detailed strategies for places, transportation, infrastructure, community facilities & amenities.

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
