The Charlotte Historic District Commission (HDC) was established in 1976 by an act of City Council as part of the redevelopment of the Fourth Ward. Today, the HDC's responsibility has grown to include design review and enforcement in the Local Historic Districts of Dilworth, Hermitage Court, McCrorey Heights, Oaklawn Park, Plaza Midwood, Wesley Heights, and Wilmore. In addition, the HDC and its staff provide historic preservation education and technical advice for other local government agencies and the community at large.
