

Landscape Maintenance

Stormwater Best Management Practices

Protect creeks and lakes.
Avoid fines for polluting.



Yard Waste

- ✓ Never dump yard waste along stream banks or into storm drains — it clogs drains that increases flooding risk, and pollutes water, harming fish and wildlife.
- ✓ Compost yard waste, spread it as mulch, drop it at a recycling center (for a small fee), or follow your municipality's guidance for curb pickup.
- ✓ Do not blow yard waste onto streets or other paved areas.

Fertilizer & Pesticide Application

- ✓ Use eco-friendly or natural options whenever possible.
- ✓ Read and follow label directions and safety data sheets (SDS) for proper use, storage and disposal of fertilizers and pesticides.
- ✓ Avoid applying fertilizers and pesticides within 25 feet of streams, lakes and ponds.
- ✓ As a general rule, avoid applying within 48 hours of a rain event—products may wash away instead of soaking in.

Storage & Disposal

- ✓ Triple-rinse containers before properly disposing of them. Pour the rinse water into landscaped areas—not onto a paved area or into a storm drain.
- ✓ Keep containers sealed and stored where stormwater can't reach them. Place them in secondary containment so any leaks or spills are captured safely.
- ✓ Train employees on best management practices for application, storage, and disposal. Keep training materials easily accessible and on-site for quick refreshers.

Spills & Leaks

- ✓ Secure product containers in vehicles to ensure that spills do not occur.
- ✓ Keep spill response materials in vehicles in case a spill occurs.
- ✓ Never hose down outside spills. Use absorbent and dry cleanup methods instead.
- ✓ Maintain equipment (tanks, hoses and fittings) to prevent leaks.
- ✓ Report spills and leaks greater than 25 gallons or any amount that enters the storm drain system to 311.
- ✓ Train employees on spill response.
