



TYPE:

Deciduous



SIZE:

50 feet high 30 feet wide



SUN:

Full to partial sun



FLOWERS:

Small, greenishwhite flowers



USDA ZONES:

3-9



ID TIPS:

Dark, glossy foliage that develops beautiful crimson, purple, yellow or orange fall color. Bark is thick and becomes blocky as the tree matures.



WILDLIFE VALUE:

Flowers are an excellent source of nectar for bees.



INTERESTING FACT:

The first Nyssa species was a swamp-growing type and was named in honor of the mythological Greek water nymph, Nyssa.









NYSSA SYLVATICA

BLACKGUM

Waxy, dark-green summer foliage changes to scarlet in fall. Grows well on moist or dry sites. Although slow-growing, it needs to be placed in the right spot, as it is difficult to transplant. The tree produces an egg-shaped, blue-black fruit which matures in the fall.
