### **Project Updates**





**SEAP+ Adopted by Charlotte City Council**: On Tuesday, May 27, the Charlotte City Council officially adopted the Strategic Energy Action Plan Plus (SEAP+)! This is a significant milestone, as SEAP+ serves as the updated and expanded roadmap to achieving Charlotte's ambitious climate and energy goals. Charlotte Mayor Vi Lyles emphasized the importance of this adoption, stating, "SEAP+ adoption is another strong step toward our goal of becoming a global leader in environmental sustainability. I am proud of our achievements so far, and I am eager to continue the bold work laid out in this plan." This comprehensive plan was developed with significant community input, including a public survey, numerous outreach events, and guidance from a Technical Advisory Committee of local sustainability experts.

The updated SEAP+ brings several key advancements, including an updated Greenhouse Gas Emissions Inventory, a focus on climate risks, and a complete reimagining of our focus areas. We've reaffirmed the importance of Buildings, Energy Generation, and Transportation while integrating workforce development as a key component within each. Additionally, a new Cross-Sectional focus area now ties together crucial aspects like water conservation, waste diversion and reduction, smart data approaches, urban heat mitigation, and our city's tree canopy.

**Acknowledgments:** SEAP+ is a testament to Charlotte's commitment to becoming a more sustainable city. This ambitious undertaking wouldn't have been possible without the dedication of many individuals and organizations.


