I am proud to announce the successful completion of the 2022 Disparity Study, which has provided invaluable insights and contributions that will guide our future initiatives in building a level playing field for all businesses.

In FY2022, the CBI Program continued to progress, including:

- Increasing our overall spend with Certified MWSBE to over \$193 million
- Growing our CBI directory of Certified MWSBE vendors to 1,453 a 38% increase from 2019
- 300% increase in the number of contract opportunities posted in our EarlyBird forecasting site
- 21% increase in the number of Certified MWSBE Vendors added to our "Million Dollar Club"
- The funding of the CBI Contractor Development Program (construction bonding initiative)

These achievements are not possible without the collective efforts of the entire organization including the Charlotte Business Inclusion team, CBI departmental liaisons, the Charlotte Business Inclusion Advisory Committee, City of Charlotte Senior Leadership, City Council support and our valued MWSBE vendors.




MWSBEs City Certified





Total Spend: Certification & Work Category















Get Certified

- Provide a commercially useful function to the City
- 1/4 SBA size standard
